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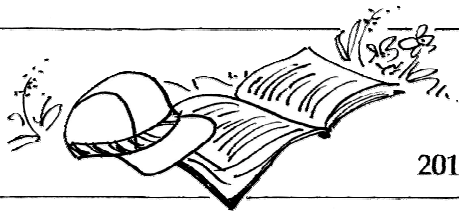

Minister's Letter - June 2011

Dear Friends,

You'll have to excuse me this time, but as you know I'm a grandparent!

- I know what you're saying, "*there's nothing wrong with being a grandparent!*"

Well, of course, I know that, but us grandparents do have the habit of thinking our grandchildren are the most wonderful children in the world, don't we?



Just recently we discovered that our eldest granddaughter has a beautiful singing voice and, having found this the family persuaded her to have singing lessons. - To co-ordinate the maintenance requirements of the building and to arrange that repairs are carried out within the delegated budget.
- To ensure that the annual servicing of boilers and fire extinguishers is completed and that the annual gas safety certificate is obtained.
- To liaise with the caretaker and cleaner is as required (not line manage).
- To accompany the inspector at the 5 yearly building inspection to receive the report of that inspection and advise the Property Committee of its contents.

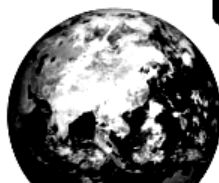

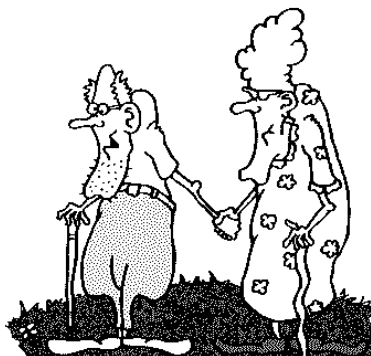
Of an Age?

The elderly husband hung his head. “Actually, I forgot the old lady’s name about ten years ago.”



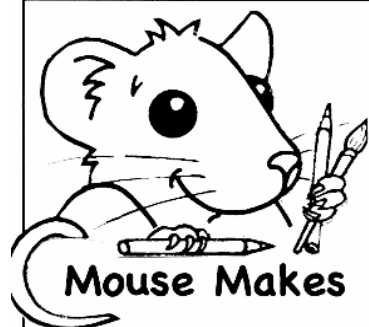
June 2nd Ascension Day

Surely the most tender, moving ‘farewell’ in history took place on Ascension Day. Luke records the story with great poignancy: *“When Jesus had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, he lifted up his hands - and blessed them.”*

As Christmas began the story of Jesus’ life on earth, so Ascension Day completes it, with his return to his Father in heaven. Jesus’ last act on earth was to bless his disciples. He and they had a bond as close as could be: they had just lived through three tumultuous years of public ministry and miracles – persecution and death – and resurrection! Just as we part from our nearest and dearest by still looking at them with love and memories in our eyes, so exactly did Jesus: *“While he was blessing them, he left them and was taken up into heaven.”* (Luke 24:50-1) He was not forsaking them, but merely going on ahead to a kingdom which would also be theirs one day: *“I am ascending to my Father and to your Father, to my God and your God...”* (John 20:17)

The disciples were surely the most favoured folk in history. Imagine being one of the last few people on earth to be face to face with Jesus, and have him look on you with love. No wonder, then that Luke goes on: *“they worshipped him - and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God.”* (Luke 24:52,53)

No wonder they praised God! They knew they would see Jesus again one day! *“I am going to prepare a place for you... I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am.”* (John 14:2,3) In the meantime, Jesus had work for them to do: to take the Gospel to every nation on earth.

PENTECOST

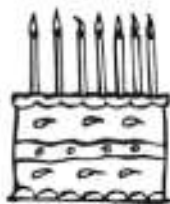
12th June

Of the three main festivals in the Christian year, Pentecost or Whitsun is the least celebrated today.

The women's group, however, concluded that computers should be masculine ('el computador'), because:

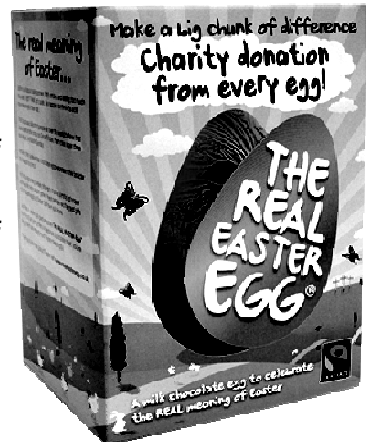
1. In order to do anything with them, you have to turn them on;

Record demand for 'Jesus Egg' shows people were not afraid to talk about faith at Easter

In the weeks leading up to Easter, supermarkets and independent retailers across the UK were inundated with calls from customers searching for the first release of The Real Easter Egg. It is the first and only Fairtrade egg to mention Jesus and the events of Holy Week on the box.

Morrison's, Waitrose, Co-op and Booths stocked a limited 'trial listing' of the Real Easter Egg and Traidcraft's network of 6,500 retailers, a number of independent shops and a selection of cathedrals also stocked The Real Easter Egg. Schools ordered a further 30,000 eggs.



Dame Judi Dench, Sir Ben Kingsley and a host of Coronation Street stars have backed the egg and Ecclesiastical funded a national competition for schools and churches. With their help, with the support of Archbishops, bishops and hundreds of schools and churches, The Real Easter Egg became the biggest mail order egg in the UK before going into stores. David Marshall, speaking for Manchester based Meaningful Chocolate Company, which developed the egg, said; *"Response was overwhelming and we went to four production runs to meet demand."* For more details, visit:

## RESHAPING THE DISTRICT

- a response to Regrouping for Mission - **Matthew Reed**

### Introduction

Regrouping for Mission (R4M) starts by highlighting that our organisational structures developed and grew at a time when our membership and resources were very much greater, but has not been rethought as our numbers and resources have reduced. More importantly, it has not been altered to respond to the changing nature of God's world around us, and the challenges and calls He now presents to us.

## **The ReShaping Agenda**

From September 2008, the District Development Enabler (DDE), in conjunction with District Chair Andrew Wood, worked with circuits on a number of projects helping them explore their mission potential, with particular reference to R4M. They also looked at situations around the Connexion for parallel experiences. It became clear that mission was being limited by our circuit structure in six areas:

- The administrative burden
- Big issues swamping circuit life
- Resource sharing
- Discernment and decision making
- Isolated ministers and other staff
- Vision restricted by boundaries

## **The Benchmark - A starting point based on best practice and aspirations.**

Key to the agenda is a group of benchmarks that suggest a viable size for circuits. Based on best practice from around the District and elsewhere in the Connexion, they offer rough guidance as to what might reasonably be expected, as a starting point for discussions. Circuits are encouraged to consider how they fit the benchmarks, and to question whether that is appropriate for them, given their local circumstances: churches (and staff) should expect to be organised according to the Benchmark for the District, unless they can justify a different position.

1. Circuits should have between 160 and 220 members per minister.
2. Circuits should have between four and nine ordained staff (640 to 1980 members).
3. Circuits should have a maximum drive time of 60 minutes for the journey between key centres.
4. Circuits should include more than one larger church (100+ members).
5. Circuits should have geographical and community coherence.

## **The Response**

Almost all circuits are engaged with the agenda in some way. In many cases there was already an emerging understanding that a new bigger shape would be helpful to their work, and the Agenda has provided a necessary catalyst to the negotiations. In other areas, open discussion meetings between circuit teams have led to a clearer

understanding of the nature and identity of the circuits involved, leading to the forming of new relationships and potential formal relationships emerging. Not all circuits see combining with other circuits as the way forward, but have looked to other relationships or strategies to fulfil their needs, including working ecumenically or through federations.

Almost inevitably the initial response has focussed on the structural aspects of *reorganisation*, *but in most cases the teams have quickly realised that this as an opportunity* to refocus their circuit life on mission, with the opportunity to leave behind much of our existing practice in order for a new circuit to be clearly tasked with building God's kingdom. Structural matters are important in that they manage the resources for mission, but should not be the steering factor in establishing a new way of working. For this reason most negotiations concern the building of new circuits, with a new style and identity, rather than merging of existing circuits.

## **Procedures**

It has quickly become clear that a new approach to the administrative procedure of creating new circuits was needed both to cope with the numbers of such situations expected in the next two years, and to be in keeping with the new mood for a lighter administrative burden. The District Policy Executive (DPE) meeting in February approved a new process for implementing Standing Order 501(3) which is simple and clear, the key points being:

- The formal consultation is triggered by a request from the Circuit Leadership Teams (CLT) of all the circuits involved, and can be started without waiting for a meeting of DPE.
- The DDE, in conjunction with the Chair and DPE Secretary, works with the circuits involved through the consultation process and reports back to DPE.

## **Summary**

The District "Ground-up" approach to R4M is resulting in progress that is firmly based in the wishes of the circuits themselves, and that the Reshaping Agenda has helped this process to move forward significantly. As a result of this work, three pairs of circuits have already requested DPE to start formal consultation procedures towards the creation of new circuits. The challenge now is for circuits to seize the moment to ensure a focus on relevant and sustainable mission, based on the needs of their area and the wider Methodist Church.
