



Two hundred Methodists have taken part in a pilgrimage that has involved visiting each of the 23 churches that will be part of the new **East Solent and Downs Methodist Circuit**. Many churches provide opportunities for children and young people to have fun, be safe and enquire about the world around them. GUESS WHO -- ON THE PILGRIMAGE!!

We decided to attend a meeting at Drayton Methodist Church and felt this was something we could do - a Pilgrimage around the Churches of the new emerging Circuit. David Rice and his wife Alison showed us the proposed route on a map and we decided that we could take turns driving our car and walking as much of the route as possible.

The Pilgrimage for Patrick and myself has been 6 days of laughter, much food, good conversation and making new friends, God was kind to us and except for the Saturday we walked in dry weather. Seeing superb views and shady woods with sunlight dappling our paths. With sheep watching us and some cows



wanting to join us!! We completed the Pilgrimage feeling very tired, having gained weight (despite all the walking!!) and with a feeling of satisfaction at having visited 19 of the 23 Churches.

The walk was supposed to be about 85 miles but we all think it felt like much, much more as we did not walk direct from any one Church to another. The map marking our walk showed a very wibbly worbly worm of a route by the time we finished. We joined the journey at Trinity MC Church, Southsea.

For example in walking from Trinity to Eastney - 10 minutes in a straight line. Oh no - we went down to the sea front all around Canoe Lake, wandered through the rose garden, along past the golf course and then wound our way up through the back streets in a zigzag way to Eastney taking well over the hour.

Patrick and I took it in turns to walk or drive the car to ensure I walked the easiest bits and avoided most of the hills(!), and got the car to the last Church each day. We were amazed at so many₄of the folk from the north of the new Circuit walking with us, some every day, and others meeting us at each

Church. We were met at so many of the stopping points by people from the local congregation also and although requests had been made for light meals we seemed to be offered cakes and more cakes at tea breaks and sumptuous meals at lunch and evening. Some of our friends from our current/old Circuit came and joined us on a few of the days to walk one leg of the route or to join us for a meal or the service. (Bobby)

And Ian says:-

The ES&D Circuit Pilgrimage, approximately 91 miles around all 23 constituent churches, the brainchild of David Rice (Haslemere) has been completed... or has it...?

The walking journey started in Copnor and was completed in Haslemere. The first three days each saw four churches visited, the next two, three churches, then two and finally three on the last day. Five people completed the whole journey (three from Haslemere and one each from Drayton and Emsworth) but there were never fewer than ten pilgrims journeying at any one time. On occasions, the day's 'monitor' had to keep tabs on more than twenty pilgrims with much swapping and changing during the course of the day. Four of the stalwarts slept on church premises most nights, one becoming an expert in forming a suitable mattress using kneelers of varying number, size and thickness. (lan as you might guess!)

Each day the pilgrims were joined by church members for a short, standard Liturgy conducted in each church. This comprised: the partial learning of the 'Paschal Procession'- a line a day; a church representative giving a greeting, stating that establishment's origins, present situation and ambitions; prayers of intercession wonderfully drawn together by David for each church; the singing of a hymn or song from the 'Pilgrimage Handbook'; a final Pilgrim prayer to send us on our way.

The first and last Services on each day contained additional prayers and a reflection on the day with the 'mark of a pilgrim' being added to each day. The final Service at Haslemere drew all aspects together including the singing of the whole 'Paschal Procession' correctly for the only time.

The actual walking didn't present too much of a problem; getting away from each church with people in deep conversations was. However, we had to be disciplined in this respect in order to arrive in time for the next carefully and well prepared meal. (*lan*)

We all enjoyed exploring each Church and hearing about its journey from formation to now, their present situation and their hopes and dreams for the future. All so different yet really all working to the same aim; to spread the

good news of Jesus Christ and the love of God for all. Local Preachers checking out the heights of the lecterns, pulpits and someone checking out the chairs. (I think they felt ours would suit their needs for stacking and comfort!!)

Many new and interesting people were met during the pilgrimage. Great were the friendships and conversations covering a myriad topics. The support given readily to those determined to 'walk a stint' but who found it a bit difficult was spontaneous and enduring and appreciated. It was estimated that well over 200 people had been involved in some form or other during the eight days. The observation of how different communities were served together with the diversity of thoughts, ideas and available skills was amazing. The overall organisation and execution of the pilgrimage was brilliant in all respects. In addition to David's terrific personal input we have to thank his wife, Alison, and Christine Taylor (Haslemere) for co-ordinating the overall plan, Garry Bagshaw for co-ordinating the transport arrangements and Bobby and Patrick Watson together with Janet Baker (Emsworth) who, with Garry, conducted much of the fetching and carrying.

So, back to the original question: has the pilgrimage been completed or has it just started? That the new Circuit will manage administratively I have little doubt due to the enthusiasm and capabilities of those setting about the task. It is now up to the present and future members of the individual churches comprising the Circuit to ensure that it not only exists but that it thrives. There are obvious opportunities for individual churches to assist others, particularly in matters of 'Outreach' (*lan*)

We hope we have given you a flavour of a really enjoyable, inspiring and thought provoking week.

DID YOU KNOW....

That a baby, born on 27th March 1912 at 38 Funtington Road Copnor, and who was to become Prime Minister of the United Kingdom, was baptised at a Methodist Church in the Portsmouth Circuit.

Extract from the Register of Baptisms at Copnor Methodist Church

22nd April 1912: Leonard James Callaghan son of James Callaghan and Charlotte Callaghan.

He also had an older sister, Dorothy, born in 1904, before the first Copnor Church was built.

Leonard attended Portsmouth Northern Secondary School, which then changed its name to the Northern Grammar School for Boys and is now Mayfield School.

He was the only Prime Minister to have held all four of the "Great Offices of State", Chancellor of the Exchequer (1967), Home Secretary (1967 to 1970), Foreign Secretary (1974 to 1976) and then Prime Minister (1976 to 1979). He has a road named after him at the top of Portsdown Hill.

He died in 2005 at Ringmer, in East Sussex.



ARCHBISHOP OF CANTERBURY'S ADDRESS TO CONFERENCE Denounces Economic Injustices

The Rt Hon and Most Revd Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury, says there is a "gross imbalance in the allocation of resources" in society.

In his recent address to the Methodist Conference, the Archbishop drew on the North/South economic divide, pointing out that the spending per head on infrastructure in the North East was £5 compared to more than £2,000 in the South. "There is a danger of the radical individualisation of our society, meaning whole sectors dismiss others sectors," he said. "Economics has to be our servant, not our master."

Archbishop Justin said that Churches should stand alongside the poor; not just talk to them, as he expressed concern about the rise of food banks in the UK and made the argument that inflation was a tax on the poor. The Archbishop went on to say that Churches should unlock the wealth that God offers through God's Spirit. "The common good is resourced in the generosity of God and nowhere else" he said.







the supermarket. Perhaps our harvest isn't one that others can easily see. We might not make or grown things but we can offer whatever we do to God as our harvest.


Outside, the trees are beginning to lose their leaves but you can


MAKE YOUR OWN FOREST

Take a piece of stiff card or thin paper and fold it in half, creasing it down the centre. Then open it out and fold both sides to the centre crease.

Fold the paper as shown and draw half a tree on the top fold. Cut round the tree then glue the centre faces together. This makes a three sided tree.

You can paint the tree before gluing it or afterwards. A forest of them would look good as name cards for a party or you could make just one as a different birthday card for a friend.










