











# The Way I See It: GUNPOWDER TREASON

'A planned bomb attack by religious extremists on a strategic site in central London has been foiled by the security services, acting on secret intelligence. Eight men have been arrested and charged.'

That could be a story from yesterday's newspaper, but in fact (as astute readers may have guessed) it's an account of an event over 400 years ago which will be marked with thousands of bonfires up and down the land this month

On 5th November 1605, a man called Guy Fawkes was discovered with something like 36 barrels of gunpowder in a crypt underneath the House of Lords on the day of the State Opening of Parliament. He was apprehended, and under torture revealed the names of his co-conspirators, all Roman Catholics intent on assassinating the King, James 1, and restoring a Catholic monarchy to England. It's that event which, through the murky mists of time, we commemorate with fireworks, bonfires and - yes -'guys' on 5th November every year.

As a child I remember singing, 'Please to remember the fifth of November Gunpowder, treason and plot. I see no reason why gunpowder treason should ever be forgot'. Does anyone still sing it, I wonder? Perhaps the time has come to forget Fawkes and the plot, and simply have the fireworks. Until about fifty years ago there was still an anti-catholic element in some of the bonfire night celebrations. Thankfully, just as such religious conflicts are very much part of our distant past, so in recent times have we seen that the endless recitation of ancient feuds helps no one - and may even distort history. After all, even in 1605 Fawkes and his companions didn't have the support of most of their fellow-Catholics, and it's very possible that the intelligence that uncovered the plot came from within their ranks.

We are all too aware, however, that terrorism, bombs and assassination attempts are still very much part of contemporary life. There are people in today's world who misguidedly believe that they are doing God's will by killing those who do not share their refigious practice or political beliefs. Fawkes and his friends, with the kind of indifference to risk which modern

terrorists also display, were fanatically committed to their cause. They, and their modern counterparts, are a reminder that while faith is a wonderfully good thing; religious fanaticism is a dangerous delusion and violence of this kind is never the best answer to injustice. The real game-changers in modern history have risked their own lives rather than taking the lives of others: people like Mahatma Ghandi, Martin Luther King, Janani Luwum, Nelson Mandela, Lech Walensa and Oscar Romero. 'Love your enemies,' said Jesus. Then there's a good chance you'll change them, and in changing them you may change history.

# CONFERENCE - 'MESSY CHUIRCH ... WHAT NEXT?'

Jill and I decided to go along to this day conference in Cowplain led by Lucy Moore, who started Messy Church. Over 70 people attended, with a mixture of experiences of Messy Church. We soon realised that we had made progress over the past 21 months.

So what did we learn? Are there signs of growth in our Messy Church? What about discipleship? This was a lot to grapple with on a sunny Saturday in October! We were challenged on our pastoral care of the families, building relationships, managing expectations, providing courses for the parents such as the 'Y' course and our take-home messages. We were introduced to 'Table Talk for all-age Messy Moments', described by Lucy as a very valuable resource and a great "next step" for Messy Church as it helps families to have fun together and enjoy conversation that gives space for the deeper questions of life. More information is available on the internet.

So, what have we decided to do as a result of the conference? We are asking you to pray for the Messy Church team and for the families. We are aiming to tell you about our session each month and also to invite you to come along and share our simple worship. Many of you have hidden talents, others have busy lives. However, it would help to have a list of people on whom we can call when team members are missing for whatever reason. You don't even have to do any preparation – just come on the day! You may like to help at intervals that suit you – just speak to us about it. Are you interested in photography or designing posters – we certainly could use your talents. Are you good at talking to people? This is an important part of building relationships with the families.

We have come away with various ideas, which we hope to incorporate into Messy Church, such as a prayer tree, a flyer of church activities plus a thought for the day each month, more activities suitable for the boys as well as discussion for the parents when they are ready. One day we hope to have a baptism and may be a simple form of communion.

Messy Church is exciting, noisy and stimulating. These families are our future church. Help us to nurture and cherish them. Walk with us.





# POPPIES FOR REMEMBRANCE

The annual Poppy Appeal is now underway. Did you ever wonder how it all began?

It seems that poppies were first suggested as a symbol of Remembrance in the USA by a Miss Moina Michael, way back in November 1918. The American Legion used them



On the day itself, the first poppy was bought in London a few seconds after midnight. The poppies were on sale at an official price of threepence but before breakfast single petals were selling Smithfield Market for £5. All day long motor cars fetched poppies and crate after crate was emptied until supplies ran out. A message from Queen Mary brought sellers to Buckingham Palace, but hearing that poppies were in short supply, she bought only two. A basket of poppies auctioned at Christies raised nearly £500.

That first appeal raised £106,000 (nearly £30 million in today's terms). In 1922 the "Poppy Factory" was established in the UK and has been employing disabled ex-Servicemen to make the poppies ever since. Poppies were "sold" when the appeal started. Nowadays, charity legislation requires them to be 'distributed in return for donations'.

# NEW NATIONAL ADVENT CAMPAIGN AIMS TO PUT JESUS 'BACK' INTO CHRISTMAS

This year the UK has reached a tipping point: a recent survey\* has found that 51 per cent of people now say that the birth of Jesus is irrelevant to their Christmas. And just 12 per cent of adults know the nativity story in any depth; and 36 per cent of children do not know whose birthday is being celebrated during the festival.

And so it is that ChurchAds.net, the group behind the annual Christmas

advertising poster campaign, has teamed up with a number of leading churches this autumn in order to reverse this trend, and 'save' Christmas.



Christmas Starts with Christ will run from 1st December to Christmas Day. It will begin with the first ever nationwide Christmas Starts Sunday on 1st December. ChurchAds.net has the support of the Church of England, the Methodist Church, the Bible Society, Traidcraft and the Evangelical Alliance.

Francis Goodwin, of ChurchAds.net, said: "Christmas is a time when Christians shine light in their communities. But the good news is being lost. We can't sit back and let that happen. We cannot let the nation lose the real meaning of Christmas; and we are passionate about bringing the Church together for this cause to remind everyone that Christmas Starts with Christ."

Arun Arora, director of communications at the Church of England, said: "'At Christmas time thousands of churches around the country do a huge amount to carry the Christmas story into their local communities, through word and deed. The vision for the Christmas Starts with Christ campaign is to use a common logo to join the dots of these activities and project a powerful message to our entire nation that the reason for the season is the birth of Jesus.

We pray that our nation's response will be guided by the desire to achieve peace and urge our leaders to work with as wide as possible a range of regional partners and with the United Nations."

# **METHODISTS CELEBRATE 200 YEARS Of a District Missionary Society**

Methodists have celebrated 200 years since the founding of one the Church's first district missionary societies.

The Revd Ruth Gee, President of the Methodist Conference, unveiled a blue plaque marking the site of the Old Boggart House, which was the first purpose built Methodist chapel in Leeds. The blue plaque will also commemorate the public meeting held on 6 October 1813, which led to the formation of the Leeds Wesleyan Methodist District Missionary Society - the forerunner of the Methodist Missionary Society formed in 1818.

The winner? The fellow who breezed past waving a piece of toast!!



On Christmas Day colour in the flame at the top of the candle, cut the candle out and hang from the tree.



# St ANDREW feast day November 30<sup>th</sup>

The Bible tells us that Andrew and his brother Simon Peter were the very first disciples to follow Jesus. They were fishermen working at their nets when Jesus called them. It was a hard thing to do, to leave everything for an uncertain way of life but Andrew knew that Jesus so special that he had to share this wonderful knowledge with others.



Andrew followed Jesus for the rest of his life. After Jesus' death he travelled widely spreading the message and building the early church. He was arrested for being a follower of Christ and condemned to death on the cross. Legend says that he was crucified on a diagonal cross.

St Andrew is the patron saint of Scotland and his cross is on the Scottish flag which is a white cross on a blue background – the blue is for the sea which seems right for a fisherman.

# SAIL AWAY

Andrew and Simon fished with nets from the shore or from small boats. You could make a fishing fleet of small boats and decorate their sales with St Andrew's cross.

You will need a polystyrene box or tray like the ones you see at the fruit shop or supermarket.

Using a bread knife, carefully cut out several different shapes and sizes.
