WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY 2014

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity always comes 'hot on the heels' of the very busy Christmas and New Year period and so it can take us by surprise a little. However, this year, our Christians Together in Fareham (CTinF) group of which we are a part, are marking the week $16^{th} - 23^{rd}$ January with a 24/7 prayer event at The Community Church (above Café Imbizo) on West Street.

Just like last year, it is hoped that all the churches that are part of the CTinF organisation will play a part in ensuring that there is continuous prayer for one week beginning with a short act of worship on Thursday, 16th January at 7.30 pm and concluding with a service of celebration on Thursday, 23rd January at 7.30pm. Churches have signed up for 'slots' of time and our 'slot' at Fareham Methodist is on Monday, 29th January 10.00 am to 2.00pm.

The Community Church who host the event, do a great job in providing refreshments, quiet music, written articles, candles, and other stimulus to aid us in our thoughts and prayers. In the new year there will be an opportunity to sign up for a 20 minute period (or more if you choose) so that we know that at least one person will be praying in our allotted time. Of course, the prayer room at the Community Church is open all of the week, day and night, so there is nothing to stop you popping in any day or time that is convenient for you. It is hoped that as many of us as possible will be able to attend the opening and closing acts of worship as we join together with our brothers and sisters in Christ across Fareham to pray for our church communities and the people of our town and surrounding area.

St WULFSTAN 19th January

St Wulfstan was Bishop of Worcester from 1062-95. He lived during the Norman Conquest of England and was the only Saxon bishop to remain under William the Conqueror.

Wulfstan was a caring and hardworking monk. He rebuilt the cathedral at Worcester, cared for the poor, and struggled to ease the harsh conditions imposed by the Normans on the Saxons. Unlike some priests, he baptised children of the poor without charge. It is said that he never turned away people asking for help.

Wulfstan fought the slave trade in Bristol (slave trading didn't just start with slaves from Africa but had been going on for centuries with slaves from England being sold to Ireland and North Africa).

Wulfstan died whilst washing the feet of 12 poor men during a service in the cathedral. He died as he had lived, serving God and caring for others.

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THE WELL & THE RAINBOW CENTRE

The building owned by 'The Well' in West Street is now rented to a local charity, the Rainbow Centre. After a difficult few years the Well hopes that its rental income will soon allow it to start making grants to local causes and projects on behalf of the Christian Community of Fareham.

Like all charity shops the Rainbow shop relies on donations of stock from the public. It is therefore in the interest of the Christian community to ensure the success of the Rainbow shop, because not only does it support the fantastic work that the Centre undertakes with people suffering from neurological impairment (of children with cerebral palsy and adults with strokes or head injuries), but the rent that they pay provides the investment income from which The Well makes its grants. The trustees of The Well are therefore appealing on behalf of the Rainbow Centre for congregations in Fareham to support the Rainbow Centre with donations of stock to help give them a bumper Christmas. And when you drop off your goods for sale why not double your support by buying a Christmas present or two as well.
