

Dear Friends

We have been living on the South coast for nearly two years now and yet living so close to the sea still feels like something of a novelty to us. When we first moved here it felt like we were on an extended holiday before we would need to return inland and home! We no longer feel as though we are on holiday but we still appreciate being by the sea and we don't take it for granted – not yet anyway. The sea is an evocative thing. I remember as a child competing with my sister for the 5p piece that went to the first one of us to 'see the sea' when we descended over the Wolds and into Filey. I am always refreshed by a walk along the seafront and when the sea is at its most tempestuous it is a reminder to us of the power and force of nature and the elements. For many the sea is their workplace. Sea Sunday is traditionally celebrated on the second Sunday in July (a clash with Action for Children Sunday) and this is a time to remember the work of the Seafarer's Mission and the 1.5 million seafarers who live and work at sea. The Mission's work is in 260 ports around the world – Southampton named as one of them. To many of us it is an invisible workforce who bring to our shores up to 90% of the goods that we use on a daily basis.

The sea can be a dangerous place to be, not just because of difficult conditions, but because of piracy, violence and crime. As we have seen in recent weeks, for some it also represents a route to a potentially better life no matter how fraught with difficulty the journey may be.

I hope I shall get an opportunity to see the sea on more than one occasion over the summer and when I do I shall remember the work of the Seafarer's Mission and all those who live and work at sea. I hope you can take that opportunity to do so too. But if not, I hope the summer months provide other opportunities for some refreshment and a chance to spend some 'down time' with family and friends.

## Celebrating Holy Communion together

At the Worship Consultation meeting on the 1<sup>st</sup> June the report produced from the Annual Church Meeting (which appeared in the May Focus) about how we celebrate Holy Communion in our morning services was discussed. Every question and all collated responses were considered and the following recommendations are to be made to Church Council on July: 7th

- \* to increase the number of rail communions from three to six times per year thereby giving people more opportunity to come and kneel at the rail to receive the bread and wine. Currently we have three times per year set aside for a rail communion and these are at Christmas, Easter and Covenant communion services. Another three times per year will be added to establish an alternate pattern of rail and rolling communions though there will be some flexibility in this depending on circumstances and the presiding minister.

- \* To continue to share the peace as directed by the presiding minister and for the congregation to be mindful of any sensitivities that individuals may have towards this element of the service.

- \* The Communion stewards will begin to usher people forward from front row to back row unless specifically asked otherwise.

- \* To increase the variety of use of Holy Communion liturgy by using the full depth of services in the Methodist Worship Book and by also having some alternative liturgies available to use in our morning communion services.

It is the hope of the Worship Consultation group that the above recommendations reflect the nature of the comments that were shared and, whilst it is impossible to please everyone all the time, that a balance has been achieved so that we can celebrate together when we gather around the Lord's table and share in bread and wine.

## Christian Aid Week 2015



Thank you so much to all who supported Christian Aid Week. There was a lot going on this year and many people were involved: advertising; preparing and leading the service at the beginning of the week; collecting house to house and at a stall in the precinct; helping at the count and finally preparing the Church lunch at the end of the week as well as giving so generously. Much of this was gift aided. Thank you.

This year we raised: House to House collections:	£765.25
Retiring Collection on 10 <sup>th</sup> May	£302.40
Monthly Church Lunch 17 <sup>th</sup> May	£197
Grand Total	£1264.65

The stall in the shopping precinct collected £996.98 this year and another £388.99 was collected at the train station.

The total for Fareham and Portchester before gift aid was £7483.85.

The Wickham Music Festival is held annually from 6 - 9 August. It's an outdoor live music event over four days with many acts and tents on a field just outside the village of Wickham in the Meon Valley, Hampshire.

The headline act last year was James Blunt. The one day he performed over 7,000 people came to the Festival.

So, last year, deciding on an outreach project, and with a lot of prayer, Meon Valley Circuit Methodists were allowed a Christian presence for the duration of the Festival. We erected our 'Elemental Tent' within the Festival site, manned by several enthusiastic Christians from our Circuit.

We will be doing so this year (August 2015) as we have again been invited to the Festival by the organiser Peter Chegwin.

We call our Christian presence within the Festival our 'Elemental Tent'. Festival folk are gently encouraged in their journey of faith. We aim to show a Christian presence of relaxation, welcome, crafts and some prayer in and around the Tent. We even held a Harvest Festival service within the Music Festival itself last year (well, the weather was sunny too – most of the time!). We discussed faith openly and we prayed with people who asked for prayers. We had a spiritual artist last year too, and hope he will be there again this year.

Our superintendent minister the Revd David Moss leads the project, assisted by his wife Ali, with the rest of us trying to keep up. We are about to start our training for this.

We are in touch with BBC Radio Solent and we are hoping they will be interviewing us at the Festival.

## EXTRACT FROM E NEWS JUNE 2015

### **Steve Wild - President of the Conference 2015/2016**

Born in Rochdale in 1954, Steve Wild gave his life to Christ at a Cliff College Mission in 1968. He worked as a printer but heard God calling him to the Methodist ministry when he visited Taize.



Married to Laura, an artist, he began 15 years of circuit ministry first in Preston and then in St Ives, Cornwall. In 1998 he became Cornwall District Evangelism Enabler and then Connexional Evangelism Enabler Coordinator as well as working part-time with West Country TV presenting programmes about Christianity in the South West.

From 2004 Steve worked at Cliff College as Director of Evangelism and tutor. He returned to Cornwall in 2008 to become Chair of the Cornwall District. You may even have seen him in an episode of the BBC's 'An Island Parish'.

The contrast of Steve's urban roots in Lancashire and his ministry in rural Cornwall gives him broad insight, particularly concerning people experiencing hardship and poverty. Steve is known widely as a man of compassion, prayer, love and encouragement for people of all ages and backgrounds.

### TAKING & GIVING


If you look at a map of Israel you will see that there are two small inland seas. And if you look closely you will see that these two seas are linked by the River Jordan. The river starts in the northern hills and goes through the Sea of Galilee, then through the Jordan valley, and ends up in the Dead Sea. But even though the water is all from the same river, the two seas are completely different.

All around the Sea of Galilee are towns and villages, trees and farms. The Dead Sea has no trees or farms, it is dead. What makes the difference? The Sea of Galilee is alive because it has an outlet. It passes the water on as quickly as it flows in. The Dead Sea is dead because it passes no water on.
