

Dear friends,

One of the themes that I am particularly thinking about as we journey through Lent to the celebration of Easter, is hope. Hope is central to our lives and to our sense of purpose as human beings. We don't just live with a sense of the past and the present but also with a sense of the future and hope propels us forward in this way. This works on many different levels, of course. We might have hopes for the coming week, hopes for the coming month and year with plans that are already in the diary and will be fulfilled as time unfolds.

Hope is central to our faith and to the celebration of Easter. As we celebrate the risen Christ our hope is that we rise with Him and as Paul puts it in his letter to the Romans, 'we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God'. This is a greater hope than we can ever imagine and in faith we look forward to it! As the writer to the Hebrews puts it 'faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen'. As we reflect on our own Christian journeys and as we experience the happenings in our world today, we can probably see times when our hope has felt robust, strong and certain but also times when hope has felt more challenged and fragile. My prayer is that as we approach the season of Easter we may have an assurance of hope in our hearts and that no matter what we might face in the future weeks and months we would know that God is there with us, encouraging us with His presence and with His promise of abundant eternal life.

This will be my last letter for a while as I begin my 3 month sabbatical away from Circuit life at the beginning of April. Many of you have asked about my plans for this time. My hope is that I will be able to spend some time thinking about the use of language and liturgy with people who are 'at the edge of human predicament'. This will entail spending time reading, reflecting, writing and observing practice in different healthcare settings with both Christians and non-Christians. I hope to be able to spend time with my family too. When I return I hope there will be opportunities to share with you all some of the things that I have learnt and experienced whilst I have been away.

In the meantime, I wish you a blessed Easter season and send all my good wishes for the next few months.


SUNDAY LUNCH 15th April at 12.15 p.m. approximately

Messy Church – doings and sayings!

Messy Church is always busy. Helping out with the registration in the Welcome Area last week enabled me to speak to everyone! It was wonderful to hear that one of our regular mums had brought along a friend of one of her sons, following a conversation with his mother at the school gates that evening. His mother had a toddler and baby to look after but has been urged to come along next month. It was interesting to watch both the children and the mums. New friendships are made and mums have time for a cup of tea and to talk to one another.

Over the last few months we have looked at the 'Stairway to heaven', 'Families', and 'Second chances'. Cooking is always a popular activity especially if the final product can be eaten with our meal later. 'Second chances' involved thinking about the robbers on the cross. Easter gardens were made in clear plastic cups – one can be seen on the table in the Welcome Area – as well as making cross necklaces and rocky road cakes. Malcolm led our worship and spoke about the Last Supper. He produced a loaf that he had baked and a goblet of grape juice and everyone was invited to take of the bread and 'wine'. Some of the boys came back for seconds. The remainder of the loaf was distributed as part of our meal. Next month we are looking at 'New life and healing'. Do come along and see what we get up to and share the fellowship.

Trying to help the Environment

As we are all being told regularly in programmes by David Attenborough and others — we are destroying our planet with plastic. Governments around the world have spoken of this but not many have laid down laws. Most have issued guide lines but some areas of industry are waking up to the effects that some of their products are having on our wild life. The beauty industry is at last finding out what effect the use of minute plastic granules in body scrubs or facial lotions has in the oceans. It has been proven that these granules are appearing in the bodies of fish and other sea animals. Plastic bags are being eaten by sea turtles who think that they are jelly fish — a delicacy to turtles.

Our Government is talking of bringing in laws to limit the use of plastic but not yet. We are all being encouraged to use paper straws instead of plastic and some of the coffee shops are encouraging folk to bring their own cups rather than use the non-recyclable ones the coffee shops give away.

Last week I discovered, at Southdown's College, some little clear water cups. I thought that these would be the answer for us to use at Messy Church to spread the word about our environment and to show that we were doing our bit to save the planet, so to speak. I shall have some with me each Sunday to show anyone. If you have a look at them you will see that they are made from plant material NOT plastic. A firm called Vegware makes them and a whole range of other containers for hot use as well as cold. Their web site is worth exploring, I think that this is worth pursuing and publicising. I took them to the Lent house group so other Churches could also hear about them especially as one week the topic was centred on the environment.

However, as you probably can guess, I cannot find where to purchase these, as a member of the general public, in the quantities that we need. Large organisations can order them in the thousands for their drinks machines but we only need approximately 80 a month for Messy Church. I have tried Vegware themselves who pointed me to Chef Direct, and then Bookers, Makro, Batleys, and Nisbets in Southampton. Only Nisbets stock them as a general item but I would need to buy 1000 at a time at an exorbitant cost and go through the rigmarole of getting a Nisbets card.

So please would you all keep your eyes open, and if you do find compostable items such as these little cups available to be bought in small quantities, e.g. 100 at a time at a reasonable cost, please let me know. Also Vegware may be the first company to market such products but others will get on the band wagon due to public opinion in the near future

What did you do during Lent?

Many people give up something during Lent such as biscuits or chocolates or even grumbling! Much was said at the beginning of Lent about our approach to life through the weeks leading up to Easter. I decided not to give up something but to do something. Over the years I have bought a number of books relating to church life, Messy Church, Fresh Expressions etc. So my aim throughout Lent was to read some of these books – a chapter a day. I started with Tom Stuckey's book 'Beyond the Box – Mission Challenges from John's Gospel' along with John's Gospel. My copy of Tom's book now carries stickers and pencil marks so that I can find the quotes that inspired me. It made me look at situations in a different way, challenged me and made me wonder how we cope with some of the problems in the world today.

On the first page, Tom states that he believes God is punching holes in the institution (the church) because he wants to reshape it and that he is calling us to plant new seeds of church alongside the old since much of the old, in its resistance to change, will not survive. What a statement, especially at a time when we are being asked to think about mission and outreach for our church – not just think but do something! Further on in this first chapter, Tom writes about mission challenges. He asks us to allow God's Spirit to reshape our church, to personally renew and empower each

one of us, to celebrate the diversity of the Church, to encourage more creative relationships between different people paying particular attention to the contribution of the disempowered and those on the margins of society, to get stuck into the bigger concerns about social justice, to pray and obey, to move out of our comfort zone and talk to outsiders about God and to remain open to God. Tom assures us that there is life in abundance if we move beyond the box. All this is in the first eleven pages of the book. Each challenge is the subject of a chapter of the book. At the end of each chapter are some questions to challenge your views / feelings about what you have just read and a prayer.

It was a stimulating read and a good place for me to start. It's made me think about the people I meet in life. What do I do for the disempowered or those on the margins of society not enough I fear? The book has certainly challenged me and I hope that some of you will read it. I've now moved on to 'I am somewhere else' by Barbara Glasson who started the 'bread church' in Liverpool. Already I am reading about Barbara's encounters with those on the fringes of society, which is food for thought.
