Dear Friends,,

Last year, several weeks before Christmas, while we were out driving about the area, Jill and I saw many houses not just adorned with Christmas lights, but smothered in them. There were homes with Santas and homes with stars, and homes with spot lights on elves and others with coloured beams focussed on cut-outs of mangers and of angels. It was our feeling then that there were more lights and more decorations than in any of the previous years. I wonder what it will be like this year? – My guess is that there will be even more.



Why are there so many lights? Especially why are there so many on the homes of those who do not claim Jesus as their living Lord?

I believe that the lights that we see are expressions of defiance in the face of hard times; that they are tangible statements that when all is fragile, that when all is increasingly dark - that there is hope; that they are an attempt on the part of believers and unbelievers alike to affirm that there is goodness and joy to be had.

Surely this is a good thing – whatever we think about turning our houses into Christmas Disneyland!



For many people the lights that they string up represent sad and futile hopes – perhaps of a return to Christmas's past when life seemed better – perhaps of family gatherings like those before divorce or an untimely death – perhaps a world to escape from the problems and pressures of normal everyday life – a place where joy can be increased in proportion to the number of lights put up.



The lights of Christmas cannot and will not bring the changes we desire.

Only the Christ whose birth we celebrate on Christmas Day can do that. Only the risen and living Lord can make the celebration of his birth something that is more than a brief, frantic, and senseless time of excess.

So, as we prepare for Christmas cover your house with lights if you want to, but more importantly prepare your hearts to receive the Christ-child once again because it is only through him that all those Christmas hopes can come to be.

The Church singing group reached the last four choirs in the Radio Solent competition to select a choir to sing at their annual carol concert.



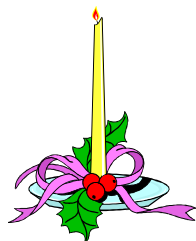

GET READY FOR CHRISTMAS



Many of us will go to the cinema this month – drawn by the trailers for the latest block-buster films set for release around Christmas. Trailers never make much sense on their own; their job is to tantalise you into wanting to know the whole story.

In his wisdom, God wrote a trailer for the Christmas story. Hundreds of years before Jesus was born, God began to tell his people just a bit of what they had to look forward to. Throughout the Old Testament there are glimpses of a coming Messiah, of a Prince of Peace. God didn't tell the people in the Old Testament everything – they had to wait for the events to actually take place. But slowly the sense of anticipation builds through the Old Testament. And when the Messiah finally came, there was surprise, but no anticlimax. Everything about the birth, life, death – and resurrection – of Jesus would surpasses all expectations.

CHRISTMAS: Why does it begin at Midnight with Holy Communion

The hour was first chosen at Rome in the fifth century to symbolize the idea that Christ was born at midnight – a mystical idea in no way hindered by historical evidence! No one knows the hour of his birth.

Certainly in recent times, Holy Communion at midnight on Christmas morning has proved popular with modern families. One British writer pointed out its “domestic convenience” in 1947: “for where there are children and no servants, husband and wife may be unable to communicate at any other time.” (So things don't change, then!)

WHERE DID CHRISTMAS TREES COME FROM?



There are two early stories that mention fir trees. The first involves St Boniface, who went to Germany in the 8th century as a missionary and found people sacrificing a child to their god under an oak tree. Boniface was appalled, and rescued the child. He then chopped down the



oak tree and found a tiny fir tree growing nearby. He gave this to the people and said: "This is a symbol of life. Whenever you look at this tree, remember the Christ-child who is the one who will give you life, because he gave his life for you."

The second early fir tree story involves Martin Luther in the 16th century. It is said that one year he decided to drag a fir tree into his home and to decorate it with candles. He used it as a visual aid, telling people that the candles symbolised Jesus as the light of the world, and the evergreen tree symbolised the eternal life that Jesus gives to us. Many of the people who followed Luther were struck by the idea, and took up the custom.

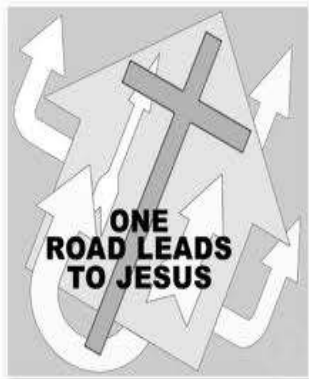
Finally she spoke up, "Grandpa, did God make you?"

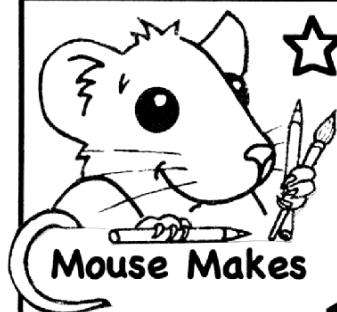

A LIGHT TO WELCOME

Just 30 years ago all people had were decorated trees and a few paper-chains at Christmas, but now we have wreaths on the front door, outdoor lights in gardens; and the most recent addition, those arched candlesticks with 7 or more electric candles to stand on windowsills.

This custom came to us from Scandinavia. WOMAN AND A FORK



There was a young woman who had been diagnosed with a terminal illness and had been given three months to live. So as she was getting her things 'in order,' she contacted her Pastor and had him come to her house to discuss certain aspects of her final wishes.

She told him which songs she wanted sung at the service, what scriptures she would like read, and what outfit she wanted to be buried in. Everything was in order and the Pastor was preparing to leave when the young woman suddenly remembered something very important to her. 'There is one more thing,' she said 'What's that?' came the Pastor's reply.

'I want to be buried with a fork in my right hand.' The Pastor stood looking at the young woman, not knowing quite what to say.

The young woman explained. 'My grandmother once told me this story, and from that time on I have always tried to pass along its message to those I love and those who are in need of encouragement. In all my years of attending socials and dinners, I always remember that when the dishes of the main course were being cleared, someone would inevitably lean over and say, 'Keep your fork.' It was my favorite part because I knew that something better was coming.....like velvety chocolate cake or deep-dish apple pie. Something wonderful, and with substance!'

So, I just want people to see me there in that casket with a fork in my hand and I want them to wonder 'What's with the fork?' Then I want you to tell them: 'Keep your fork ... the best is yet to come.'

The Pastor's eyes welled up with tears of joy as he hugged the young woman good-bye. He knew this would be one of the last times he would see her before her death. But he also knew that the young woman had a better grasp of heaven than he did. She had a better grasp of what heaven would be like than many people twice her age, with twice as much experience and knowledge. **She KNEW that something better was coming.**
