Dear Friends,

One day a lady criticised D. L. Moody, the famous evangelist of the late 1800's, for his methods of evangelism in attempting to win people to the Lord. Moody's reply was; *"I agree with you. I don't like the way I do it either. Tell me, how do you do it?"* The Lady replied, *"I don't do it."* Moody retorted, *"Then I like my way of doing it better than your way of not doing it."*






"Evangelism" is not a popular word amongst many Christians. To many of us we have visions of being accosted in the street with *"Are you saved?"* or persistent callers at the door who recite Biblical passages about *"Sin, Hell and Damnation"*. However, we cannot deny that Christ called us to *"Make disciples of all nations..."* (Matt 28) Someone once said *"Evangelism is one beggar showing another where there is food to eat"* - So, how do we reach out to our brothers and sisters with the *"Bread of heaven"*?



BackToChurchSunday I'd like to introduce you to **"Back to Church Sunday"**. This takes place across the country on the 25th September this year. Back to Church Sunday is

now the largest single local-church invitational initiative in the world. It is based on the simplest and shortest step in evangelism - that we should invite someone we already know to something we love; invite our friend to our church. The initial focus was to invite *'back'* those who used to attend, but we want to ensure that anyone who doesn't currently attend can be guaranteed a specially warm welcome.

Back To Church Sunday has grown beyond all expectations since the first one in Greater Manchester in 2004. Last year it is estimated that 100,000 extra people were invited and came to this special Sunday worship. We don't know how many of them continued to come, but I'm sure many did. - So how does it work?

The answer is simple. On Sunday 4th September we have our Covenant Service during which we will briefly explain what Back to Church Sunday is all about. We will issue everyone with some special invitation cards. What we ask you to do is, using the card, invite someone to our special service on 25th September.    BackToChurchSunday (There's no limit to how many people you can invite - extra cards will be available!). What is important is that it's a personal invitation from you.

That's all the "*Evangelism*" we ask you to do - well, that and being there to make everyone welcome on the 25th! - That's not too difficult is it?

Two and a half million people are estimated to have come forward to give their lives to Christ because of Billy Graham's preaching. You all know of Billy Graham, but how many of you know of Albert McMakin? It's a fascinating story, but simply, if it hadn't been for Albert we would never have heard of Billy Graham!

I hope you will all take this opportunity to help bring someone to Christ.

THE METHODIST WORLD MISSION FUND:

Supporting Education in Haiti

A print shop in Haiti is to be kitted out with new equipment, thanks to grants from the United Church of Canada and the Methodist Church in Britain.

The Methodist Church in Britain and the United Church of Canada are both giving \$50,000 (£30,000) towards the purchase of a second-hand Heidelberg two-colour printer, to replace one that had become damaged following the 2010 earthquake.

The Eglise Metodiste d' Haiti (EMH) ran the print shop in its Frères Campus for many years. It produced curriculum material for the EMH's 100 schools, as well as other administrative printed resources, and was one of the ways in which the EMH received an income in order to maintain its long term mission.

The damage to its printing machine was the consequence of refugees from nearby homes that had been destroyed moving into the school campus, pitching tents, being housed in undamaged buildings and the consequential use of an educational campus being transformed into a refugee camp for displaced people. Toilets blocks, classrooms, staff homes, perimeter boundaries and business within the campus were also damaged.

“When I visited the print shop in November 2010, work constantly had to be stopped and paper was being spoiled by the breakdown of the machine for which the earthquake had been one shock to much,” said Tom Quenet, the Methodist Church in Britain's partnership coordinator for Latin America and the Caribbean.

“These grants will make the EMH more efficient and make more secure the employment it offers to the present 20 people that work at the shop. This is part of the ‘building back better’ response to the disaster; it will enable the EMH to produce, more, cheaper and better quality educational materials that will not only make its products to its own student better but enable the EMH to offer more and better printing services to the Haitian educational and church communities.”

NEW PRESIDENT OF CONFERENCE

Our new President Revd Leo Osborn gave an interview to a reporter from Parish Pump prior to Conference meeting in Southport to be held on Saturday, 3 July. Below is part of that interview when he was asked various questions beginning with “How and when did you discover faith in God?”

“I was privileged to be brought up in a Christian home and going to church was second nature to me. But it was at the age of 13 that I made a commitment to Christ in response to an invitation made by David Sheppard, then test cricketer and later Bishop of Liverpool. I recognise now that all that had happened up to that point was preparing me for that time and was hugely significant.”

“Who has most inspired you on your Christian journey?”

“I wish I had a whole page for this one! Of course saints with a capital ‘S’ come to mind and Barnabas is a special favourite for his gift of encouragement and Cuthbert, too, from Lindisfarne in my own district. But saints with a small ‘s’ have been hugely important too: my mother and aunt who both showed me Jesus; Mary who prayed for me each day; George who didn’t despair of me as a trainee local preacher and Herbert who lived everything he believed. I have been immensely privileged to have known them and so many others.”

“Why have you chosen your theme – “Caring as Disciples of Jesus”?”

It really springs from the words in Colossians 1:17 where Paul tells us that “In Christ all things hold together”. One of the best ways in which we can model that to a fragmented world is through the quality and breadth of our care. But it will only ring true when, within the church, we are holding on to each other and being held together by Christ in our discipleship.”

“What are your hopes and dreams for the Methodist Church?”

“There is so much that excites me about being a Methodist Christian. Sometimes I think we tend to be envious of other Churches who we think excel in worship, preaching, evangelism, concern for the poor and marginalised and so on. But often a Church may be strong in one of these areas and weak or unconcerned in another. Yet we want to say that all these things and more besides are important, and although we don’t always get it right I value so much a Church that has helped to shape me as I hope a ‘rounded’ Christian. I wish we could celebrate this ‘roundedness’ a bit more!”

“What do you think are the greatest challenges facing the Methodist Church today?”

“We are still sometimes afraid to take risks lest we get things wrong and are not always ready to trust those whom God through the Church has called to lead us to do so! But perhaps the greatest challenge is how to proclaim the gospel we sing that ‘we have ... to proclaim’ in a world that is changing more rapidly than many of us care to admit. Because I still believe this gospel is worth proclaiming, I hope this year to learn from those who are doing so in new and creative ways.”

“What book (apart from the Bible) has been a source of inspiration to you?

“Pilgrim’s Progress would probably be top of the list but Three Men in a Boat reminds me that it is good to laugh at oneself (and of course okay to laugh at the Church too!) More recently I’ve been both challenged and helped by the writings of Brian McLaren.”

“As 2011 is the Year of the Bible what is your favourite Bible verse and passage? Why?”

“Hebrews 11-13 are wonderful chapters and I think I could preach from them forever! Faith, women and men of faith, perseverance, worship, practical Christianity – it’s all there! When I was in Crusaders as a teenager it took as its motto Hebrews 12:2 “Looking to Jesus the author and finisher of our faith” (AV). If I’m allowed to place alongside it Hebrews 13:8 “Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever” then I will be content!”

“What do you do to relax?”

“The obvious answer would be watching Aston Villa (mostly on television) but it’s not been at all relaxing this season! Warwickshire cricket is in the same category! So walking, listening to The Archers and J S Bach will have to do. (And an occasional break at our cottage in Norfolk doesn’t come amiss either!)”

Dependability, teamwork and communication should be taught alongside traditional subjects in order to prepare them for the world of work. John Fairhurst stresses: "The notion that there is a simplistic binary choice between knowledge and skills is false. Successful people have both".

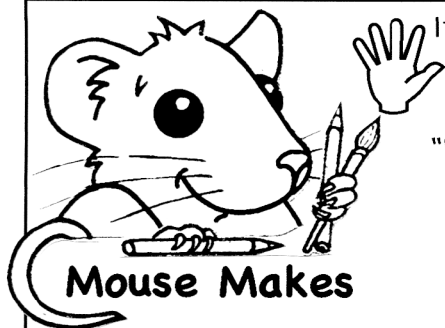

The Bible gives us some lovely pictures of how God is always willing to give us another chance. One story you may not know is of Jeremiah and the potter...

Jeremiah was a prophet, a person who gave God's message to the people. One day he watched a potter using a simple wheel to make cooking pots. One of the pots wasn't quite right, but the potter didn't throw it away and start another one. He just squashed it down and started again, this time turning it into a perfect pot. The clay had a second chance to be beautiful and useful.



Jeremiah realised that God was showing him that all of us are in God's hands. God, like the potter, gives us another chance to what we should be.

GINGERBREAD SHAPES

100 g (4 oz) margarine
100 g (4 oz) sugar
275g (10 oz) plain flour
1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
3 teaspoons ground ginger
golden syrup
(warmed, about 2 tablespoons)

Heat the oven to 180C (350F, Gas 4) and line a baking tray.

Cream together the margarine. Sift together the dry ingredients and add to the creamed mixture. Add enough syrup to make a dough.

Now all you have to do is roll out the dough on a floured board and cut it into shapes. You can make gingerbread people or any thing. If you are not happy with how they look you can, like Jeremiah's potter, squash it and start again.

Put the shapes on the baking tray and cook for 15 minutes. Cool on the tray. Finish with icing, chocolate drops etc.
