FAITH THROUGH THE GENERATIONS AND ACROSS THE SEAS

Although an Anglican for nearly 50 years, if you scratch me you quickly you will find a Methodist underneath. My Methodist heritage is still very strong. (Methodists, Congregationalists and some Presbyterians amalgamated in the 1960s to form the Uniting Church of Australia.)

My mother was born Dulcie Elizabeth Draper, daughter of another Daniel James Draper, (DJD2). (He was Fareham's Daniel James Draper's great grandson.) She was an only child. My father was Ralph Chelmsford Davis and as a young man was mentored by DJD2 in the local Methodist Church at Were Street, Brighton in Victoria, Australia. This was the Church in which they were married and I grew up.

DJD2 was a truck driver, and a local preacher. He lived with our family for several years after his wife died until his death. My mother was a woman of her time; a wonderful home maker, cook and housekeeper, running an "open" home, where many came and went receiving gracious hospitality. My father was managing director of a large, international and growing transport company, as well as heavily committed to many interdenominational Christian and mission organizations. Our home was port of call for those from diverse places: from the jungles of Borneo to the prefectures of

Japan, from American millionaires to missionaries from all over the world. As a small child I was told of DJD1, of his church building in the Victorian goldfields, and in Adelaide, South Australia. His drowning death on the SS LONDON became part of our story. The generations in between were seldom mentioned. Mark Brooks research sheds some light on why.

Recently my sister found a little Methodist chapel near her home. DJD1 had been the minister there. This sparked my interest, so I decided that, since we were planning to come to the UK, I would look for some of the UK story of DJD1. We found Mark Brooks, or did Mark find us, through a phone call to Malcolm Groom. What a joy it was, when on June 14th, we came to the Fareham Methodist Church to meet Mark Brooks, researcher extraordinaire. He knows so much about my great great great grandfather Rev Daniel James Draper! We have yet to explore all the data that Mark has assembled Russell and I chuckle about our family histories. While DJD1 was building Methodist churches in and around Bendigo in the Victorian goldfields and preaching about the grace of God and the evils of drink, Russell's forebears were brewing and selling beer. It's taken a few generations to resolve those activities.

After my mother died, my father worshipped with us at our Anglican Church. On his death twenty years ago we found this little message amongst his papers " I want it known that I died a Methodist on missionary service to the Anglican Church." So the work of DJD1 lives on in the lives of his descendants and their families, pointing to a God of grace and love, and serving in our local faith communities.








COMMUNION AND THE HOUSEBOUND

Since Malcolm joined us in Fareham a few years ago, he has introduced a number of new initiatives, perhaps one of the most important, being the Reserved Communion, which enables those who are housebound to remain in spiritual touch with those who attend the main monthly Communion Service at Kings Road.



The Reserved Communion of bread and wine is seen as an integral part of the Fareham Service, including the same elements of bread and wine, as shared in the main service conducted by the Minister, who is assisted by the Lay Steward.

It is believed that for some members of the congregation a Service of Communion which is not conducted by the Ordained Minister either in the Church or at Home lacks a certain validity. Many of us have grown up and continue to live with the expectation that the Ordained Minister is the fit and proper person to conduct such an important Service.

I have little doubt that most Ministers, if faced with a choice between the many demands made on their time and the taking of a Communion Service in a Member's Home would choose the second but life is not quite as help-ful as that.

The Methodist Church recognises that certain members of a Congregation, who have undergone training, may well be suited to sharing the Reserved Communion with a Church member, who is no longer capable of coming to Church. Not only can the one-to-one relationship be enhanced but a spiritual reality can be experienced in the sharing process.

However unwelcome, illness and dependency wait for many of us as we reach the later years of life and the contribution of a caring Church fellowship can make a huge difference to how well we cope with the challenges that life brings. The Reserved Communion, can well be an important part of the total caring process.

If you feel that you would like to pursue these ideas either now or in the future, why not have a word with your Pastoral Visitor?

The day came to recite the Psalm and Richard was very nervous, When his turn came he stepped up to the microphone and said proudly, "The Lord is my Shepherd and ... that's all I need to know".

CORONATION DAY 1953

June 2nd 1953 saw the Coronation of Elizabeth II. My father had been able to buy two seats in The



Mall (£4 each: when a girl at school heard she gasped and said "NOTHING is worth paying that much to see!!" What would the present-day equivalent be? £200?) My mother insisted he went, taking me. She would watch the day on the brand-new contraption bought by her friend across the road Mrs Smith – a television set!

We had to be up in the middle of the night to catch a train at about 5 am; everyone had to be in their seats before the roads were closed. Two men came along the corridor and opened our carriage door and told us that news had just arrived that Mt Everest had been conquered for the first time. It seemed there couldn't have been a more appropriate day for the news to reach us!

Our seats were on a stand near Admiralty Arch, near the statue which faces that of Cpt Cook. Thousands of people were on the pavements where they had spent the night. In front of them, servicemen lined the route, standing motionless to attention for hours on end, in pouring rain for most of the day. Some people near Cpt Cook's statue got drenched when his three-cornered hat filled up and overflowed!

Although it was a very long, wet day, there was plenty going on to watch all the time. Many Coronation knick-knacks were available, and Dad had bought two collapsible red, white and blue beakers. Each section was like a different coloured napkin ring, and it folded away like a nest of tables. The only trouble was, you had to remember to hold it by the top part, or it would collapse into itself with the drink in it!!

The Mall was a splendid place to be because you saw <u>two</u> processions, beginning with the shorter one to Westminster Abbey. I remember seeing the Queen and Prince Philip waving to the crowd, and other members of the Royal Family in carriages behind them. The service was relayed over loudspeakers. We all had to stand at one point, and it was, of course, pelting with rain. I think this was at the point where the Queen was anointed. I also remember this was when I heard Handel's Coronation anthem "Zadok the Priest" for the first time, and was knocked out by it.

The highlight of the afternoon was the procession returning to Buckingham Palace. and Queen Salote of Tonga, a very large lady, insisted on riding with her carriage uncovered in spite of the rain, waving excitedly to the crowd, who cheered her delightedly. It is said that there was a small man in the carriage with her, and that someone asked Noel Coward, "Who's that, Noel?" "Her lunch," came the reply.



The golden Coronation coach came past again. This time the Queen wasn't waving; she was sitting very still, wearing the heavy crown and holding the orb and sceptre. You could just about see her in the shadowy interior.

This was a truly wonderful day, which no one present would ever forget. A film was made and shown in cinemas, so people like us eventually got to see all the bits we'd missed, which, of course, those at home with TV had been able to see happening live – very fortunately, as there had been controversy behind the scenes about the whole idea of televising such an occasion. RUTH

The Book of Ruth is one of the shortest books in the Old Testament and it tells the story of a girl who came from Moab. Ruth married one of 2 brothers, both of whom died. Her husband's mother decided to leave Moab and to return home to Bethlehem. Orpah, the wife of the other brother, stayed in Moab but rather than leave Naomi old and alone Ruth went with her saying, 'Where you go, I will go; your people shall be my people, and your God my God'.

Ruth and Naomi were poor and had to search for food but were protected by Naomi's relative Boaz. In time Boaz married Ruth and they had a son called Obed who in turn was grandfather to King David the founder of the royal line which led to the birth of a another boy at Bethlehem, the baby Jesus.

Naomi and Ruth both knew what it was to be a stranger in a foreign land but they supported each other. The story of Ruth shows us the love and loyalty that can hold a single family together.
