

I have heard old age, particularly for those of us who live to be the oldest of the old, described as being a strange land. In the words of the psalmist, 'how shall we sing the Lord's song in a strange land?'



We cannot give people a song to sing but by nurturing body, mind and spirit, we have lots of ways to help the older people we serve find their own song. Everyone has spiritual needs - a need for meaning and purpose in life. We ensure opportunities are available to achieve spiritual well-being through resources that are provided through:

- A chaplain in every MHA residential community
- A team of music therapists for people living with dementia
- Trained reflexologists
- Over 4,000 dedicated volunteers

One of our Chaplains recently ran a meditation group, (and alternative for those residents who found they couldn't engage with a service of worship). The chaplain told me she was surprised when a resident who was a well-known atheist said he was going to come. At the end of a short period of time, with a candle burning, she asked how people had found it. The gentleman said "I met God". She asked what had God said and he said "Welcome". That gentleman died the following week, very peacefully and the Chaplain told me she felt that session had given him the freedom to meet God. It is a privilege to serve and be alongside older people.

BEATITUDES FOR FRIENDS OF THE AGED

WITH EPIPHANY IN MIND....

I was telling my three boys the story of the Nativity and how the Wise Men brought gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh for the infant Jesus. Clearly giving it a lot of thought, my six-year-old observed, "Mum, a Wise Woman would have brought nappies".

GENERAL SYNOD REJECTED WOMEN BISHOPS - Just what happened that day?

As everyone knows, The General Synod of the Church of England voted in late November to reject the draft legislation to allow women to become bishops. What exactly happened?

Well, under the requirements of the Synod, the legislation required a twothirds majority in each of the three voting houses for final draft approval. Whilst more than two thirds voted for the legislation in both the House of Bishops (44-03) and the House of Clergy (148-45), the vote in favour of the legislation in the House of Laity was less than two-thirds (132-74). The vote in the House of Laity fell short of approval by 4 votes.

In total, 324 members of the General Synod voted to approve the legislation and 122 voted to reject it. The consequence of the "no" vote of terminating any further consideration of the draft legislation means that it will not be possible to introduce draft legislation in the same terms until a new General Synod comes into being in 2015, UNLESS the 'Group of Six' (the Archbishops, the Prolocutors and the Chair and Vice Chair of the House of Laity) give permission and report to the Synod why they have done so.

Speaking after the vote, the Rt Revd Graham James, Bishop of Norwich, said: "A clear majority of the General Synod voted in favour of the legislation to consecrate women as Bishops. But the bar of approval is set very high in this Synod. Two-thirds of each house has to approve the legislation for it to pass. This ensures the majority is overwhelming. The majority in the House of Laity was not quite enough.

"This leaves us with a problem. 42 out of 44 dioceses approved the legislation and more than three quarters of members of diocesan synods voted in favour. There will be many who wonder why the General Synod expressed its mind so differently.

"The House of Bishops recognises that the Church of England has expressed its mind that women should be consecrated as bishops. There is now an urgent task to find a fresh way forward to which so many of those who were opposed have pledged themselves."

The day after the 'no' vote, the House of Bishops of the Church of England met in emergency session to consider the consequences of the vote. At the end of November The Archbishops' Gouncil of the Church of England also met, when a substantial amount of time was given over to a discussion of the recent vote. A statement read: "Many council members commented on the deep degree of sadness and shock that they had felt as a result of the vote and also of the need to affirm all women serving the church - both lay and ordained - in their ministries.

"In its discussions the Council decided that a process to admit women to the episcopate needed to be restarted at the next meeting of the General Synod in July 2013. There was agreement that the Church of England had to resolve this matter through its own processes as a matter of urgency. The Council therefore recommended that the House of Bishops put in place a clear process for discussions in the New Year, with a view to bringing legislative proposals before the Synod in July."

WORK CONTINUES ON ANGLICAN METHODIST COVENANT

The Joint Implementation Commission (JIC) of the Anglican Methodist Covenant has voiced its disappointment that the General Synod did not agree to women bishops. It added, however, that, although the vote in General Synod failed to remove a major obstacle to growing into that unity to which the Church of England and the Methodist Church are committed in the Covenant between them, the basis of that Covenant has not changed.

"There is much that still unites us and we will continue to work towards the full visible unity of our churches," said the Rt Rev Christopher Cocksworth and Prof Peter Howdle, who co-chair the JIC. The Anglican Methodist Covenant was signed at Methodist Central Hall, Westminster, on Saturday, 1st November 2003, in the presence of Her Majesty the Queen.

The name Jesus is a transliteration of a name that occurs in several languages. It is of Hebrew origin, 'Yehosua', or Joshua. Or there is the Hebrew-Aramaic form, 'Yesua'. In Greek, it became ' $I\eta\sigma\sigma\tilde{v}\zeta$ ' (Iēsoûs), and in Latin it became 'Iesus'.

The meaning of the name is 'Yahweh delivers' or 'Yahweh rescues', or 'Yahweh is salvation'. No wonder the₁angel Gabriel in Luke 1:26-33 told Mary to name her baby Jesus: "because he will save his people from their sins".

DEEP IN DEBT? NEED HELP?

January can be a scary month, when you realise just HOW much you spent on Christmas. If you are in debt, and feeling really daunted, please consider free debt counselling. Do not fall prey to companies that will charge you large fees for advice and loans. (Last January a number of people around the country who consulted debt-management companies only ended up deeper in debt!)

One organisation you might consider is **Christians Against Poverty** (CAP), which now runs 150 free debt-counselling centres in churches across the country. CAP director John Kirby says: "The isolation and fear of living with out-of-control debts is a unique kind of misery which can drive people to the edge." Details of help available: www.capuk.org



THANK GOD FOR THE INTERNET - AND FOR THAT PARTICULAR PLUMBER!

30 years ago this month the internet was first created (when on 1st Jan 1983 the ARPANET officially switched to using Transmission Control Protocol and Internet Protocol (TCP/IP). The internet has transformed our lives, but spare a thought also for another invention which was not so hitech: 150 years ago this month, on the 13th of January 1863, the British plumber and industrialist Thomas Crapper launched the one-piece pedestal flushing toilet. What would your life be like today, without either?

The Bible records how, when Israel was in the wilderness, struggling to build the tabernacle, that people of goodwill, "to whom the Lord had given ability, and who were willing to come and do the work," transformed the lives of everyone around them for the common good.

Not many of us will invent something that will transform the world. But each one of us HAS been given some sort of ability from God. The rest is up to us. Are we willing to 'come and do the work' required that will put our 'ability' to the common good, and improve the life of even one person around us? The story of Tabitha is told in Acts 9:36-43. She 'was always doing good and helping the poor'. When she died, her distraught friends turned to St Peter for help. 'All the widows stood around him, crying and showing him the robes and other clothing that Tabitha had made while she was still with them.' God richly blessed Tabitha for her willingness to use her ability to help others, for when Peter prayed for her, she rose from the dead.

You probably won't be brought back from the dead by the minister one day (!), but wouldn't it be great to know that your life will have made a difference to someone? That people are really going to remember you with love? The Bible observes: 'It is more blessed to give than to receive'. (Acts 20.35)
