Dear friends,

I enjoy reading some modern fiction and I am currently enjoying a book called 'The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry' by Rachel Joyce. I am only part way through the book at the time of writing this, but it is the story of a man who, in response to a surprise letter from a woman he used to work with, begins a journey on foot to walk 500 miles or so to reach her bedside where she is dying of cancer. And he isn't that far into the walk before he realises that this pilgrimage is beginning to change him. As he walks he begins to realise that his awareness of his surroundings and who he is, is growing. As he walks he reflects on his life (not always happy) and relationships (not always fulfilling) and what is motivating him to keep going, especially when red and blistered feet begin to pain him. One paragraph ends with the words 'he was already different from the man who had set out......He was beginning again'.

I have always seen Lent (and Advent) as a time of pilgrimage. As I read about Harold's exploits and my Bible through the lens of faith it seems to me there are many parallels to be had. Lent this year begins on February 18th and our Ash Wednesday service is at Portchester Meth-

odist Church at 9.30am. This will be a fitting start to a walk that we are called to make. An unlikely pilgrimage that should heighten our awareness of our surroundings and deepen our understanding of who we are. A walk that may at times be painful as wounds of our walking make their presence felt. A pilgrimage that will ultimately end in the events of Holy Week and the suffering of Christ that we encounter there. And if I haven't sold it to you very convincingly yet, *remember* it is a walk that enables us to 'begin again' and has the power to change us for the good.

In Lent, I am beginning 'The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Claire Simpson' and, if you take up the challenge, you are beginning 'The Unlikely Pilgrimage of ... (insert own name here)....'

Ebola Appeal

The total raised by our appeal at Christmas was £483.24. This included the collections at the Carol Service and Communion on Christmas eve, together with donations sent directly to me. Thanks to everybody who contributed to this magnificent result.

The money was sent via All We Can formerly the Methodist Relief and Development Fund who are responding to the Ebola crisis in West Africa through their emergency partner, the ACT Alliance.

In Liberia, ACT partner the Lutheran Church in Liberia is providing food for quarantined communities and families of victims of Ebola and hygiene supplies including soap and chlorine for hand washing to help prevent infection. They are also raising awareness to help communities understand how Ebola is contracted and prevent infection and providing psychosocial support for Ebola survivors, their families, community members, and service providers, to help people cope with very challenging situations.

In Sierra Leone, ACT partner the Council of Churches in Sierra Leone is also providing hand washing materials to prevent infection and supporting awareness-raising activities in communities.

Food Allergies and Intolerances

As from last December it has become law that ALL food served or sold to the general public must have all ingredients, and especially any ALLER-GENS, listed & easily identifiable. This affects all food producers, but especially those, for Mini Market, Thursday Coffee, Messy Church, Lunches and makers of breads, cakes, jams, preserves to be sold at fund raising events or fairs

The 14 ALLERGENS are:

CELERY includes celery stalks, leaves & seeds and celeriac

CEREALS CONTAINING GLUTEN includes wheat (such as spelt & Khorasan wheat/ Kamut) rye, barley & oats

CRUSTACEANS includes crabs, lobster, prawns, shrimps & scampi

EGGS

FISH (found in Worcester sauce and some stock cubes)

LUPIN includes lupin seeds & flour

MILK (found in butter ,cheese, cream, milk powders and yoghurt)

MOLLUSCS includes mussels, land snails, squid & whelks

MUSTARD includes liquid mustard, mustard powder& mustard seeds

NUTS includes almonds, hazelnuts, walnuts, cashews, pecan nuts, Brazil nuts, pistachio nuts, macadamia or Queensland nuts

PEANUTS (found in groundnut oil & peanut flour)

SESAME SEEDS

SOYA (found in bean-curd, edamame beans, miso paste, textured soya protein, soya flour & tofu)

I am very aware that some may be put off by this new regulation but I promise you it is not so difficult. To make this as easy as possible I am putting in place the following actions which have been endorsed by the Church Council:

All meal producing teams will nominate one person to be responsible for collecting and having knowledge of ingredients and allergens in the food being served

Ingredient/Allergen check lists available and to be completed for ALL

HOME produced foods and handed to the responsible person

Any breads, cakes, jams, chutneys for sale to be labelled with all ingredients and allergens identified

Lists of the 14 allergens to be displayed in both kitchens

Notice to Public kept in both kitchens and displayed by hatches during meal times / open hours

The Rainbow Centre celebrates New Year

The New Year marks a strong start for The <u>Rainbow Centre</u>, as it begins celebrations and activities, which will continue throughout the year to commemorate our 25 year anniversary. The centre, which has a long-standing legacy of helping children and adults to gain greater independence and mobility, despite many being advised that this would not be possible, is pleased to continue to offer this support through a unique form of learning called <u>Conductive Education</u>.

In March of last year, the centre found itself at crisis point and launched an appeal to ensure that its vital service, which spans from Surrey to the Isle of Wight and Poole across to Chichester, would continue to help vulnerable children and adults. Thanks to the generosity of the public and business community, the centre raised a final total of £200,000 and also increased its attendee numbers. Centre Director, Lara Bull comments: "The success of our appeal was incredible and it has meant that we are entering our anniversary year in a far stronger position financially than we have seen for quite some time."

"The demand for our service is continuing to grow and through raised awareness, fundraising support, the recent introduction of the SEND Local Offer, and our link with <u>Action Cerebral Palsy</u>, we believe that with time, the centre could expand its service to the wider community via an outreach programme for both children and adults. We are also researching whether a holiday club during school holidays would be useful to parents, as there appears to be a shortage of this type of support for disabled children in the region."

Rainbow has so many wonderful plans lined up for this year – from our <u>Burns Night Supper</u> on 30th January to "25" challenges such as coffee mornings, sponsored slims and sky dives, to a centre open day and end of year ball; we are determined to make this a truly memorable 25 year anniversary.

We are delighted that our numbers of adult and children attendees have grown since the appeal, but would stress that we do still have capacity to take more attendees from as young as 6 months to 70+, so if you are struggling with one of the disabilities we support or know someone who has just been diagnosed, please put them in contact with the centre for an initial conversation on how we might be able to support them.

Women's World Day Of Prayer

On **Friday 6th March** an estimated 3 million people, in over 170 countries, will gather to observe the day of prayer, using an order of service written by Christian women from The Bahamas and translated into over 1000 different languages and dialects. In the British Isles alone over 5,000 services will be held. The day will begin when the sun rises over the island of Samoa, and continue until it sets off the coast of American Samoa some 35 hours later.

The theme of the service is taken from St John's Gospel, chapter 13 verse17, 'Jesus said to them: "Do you know what I have done to you?" and it challenges us to demonstrate the same radical, unconditional love for others that Jesus showed when he washed the feet of his disciples. The Bahamas consists of over 700 islands, scattered over 100,000 square miles in the Atlantic Ocean, only a small proportion of which are inhabited. It refers to itself as a 'family of islands' and in the service the needs of the smallest islands are given as much prominence as those of the larger ones.

This year the services in Fareham are being held at **St Peter & St Paul at 3pm and 7.30pm**. Everyone is welcome to attend the service, men, women - people of all ages.




