#### Dear friends,

You may remember that my letter in February was inspired by my reading of Rachel Joyce's novel 'The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry'. I thoroughly enjoyed the book and so I was delighted to discover that Rachel Joyce had written a companion novel called 'The Love Song of Miss Queenie Hennessy'. This books tells the story of the woman that Harold Fry is walking to. She is dying of cancer in St. Bernadine's Hospice in Berwick-upon-Tweed, whilst being cared for by a Catholic order of nuns. It is a funny, thought provoking and, at times, immensely moving book. The last few lines of the novel belong to Sister Philomena, the Mother Superior, who writes to Harold and in that letter she says this:

'This is the conclusion that I have come to: if we work at it, it is always possible to find a rational explanation for what we don't understand. But perhaps it is wiser once in a while to accept that we don't understand, and stop there. To explain is to sometimes diminish. And what does it matter if I believe one thing and you believe another? We share the same end.'

For some of us the event of the resurrection of Jesus Christ, as wonderful as it is, is a puzzle. By that I mean, not a puzzle that ties us up in knots and ultimately frustrates us, but a puzzle that 'to explain is sometimes to diminish'. No words are sufficient to attempt to explain the event which, we believe, has changed everything about our world. Those who were there at the time struggled to understand what was happening too. But something happened and what we believe about it might be slightly different from the person next to us, but ultimately it is where we find our end and our new beginning. So we are rightly glad and celebrate all that Christ has done for us!

'He is risen! Alleluia!'

May God bless us during this season of Easter.

# Time to rethink sanctions

In 2014, one million benefit sanctions were imposed on people. This means their payments stopped for a period of between one month and three years. The most common reason for being sanctioned is being late or not turning up for an appointment. The result is often needing to turn to a foodbank.

This is one person's story: "During the first three weeks of my sanction I continued to look for work as I was required to. By the fourth week however I was exhausted, unwell and no longer had it in me. I was not eating as I had no food and was losing a lot of weight. I told the Job Centre I was unwell through not eating but was sanctioned for another three months for not looking for work properly."

The report, **Time to rethink benefit sanctions** published by a large coalition of churches, including the Methodist Church, looks at the sanctions regime and argues strongly that it is not working and is damaging some of the most vulnerable people in society.

# Welborne report to CTIF 26 February 2015

The Council submitted the Welborne Plan to the Government-appointed Inspector in the autumn of 2014.

The Inspector came back with some modifications he required. The Council responded to these and passed them in full Council on 21 January in a marathon session that lasted from 6 - 11.20 pm

After a period of public consultation in these modifications, which ends on 9 March, the Plan will be resubmitted. If all goes well the Inspector will finalise his report and find the Plan "sound" without great delay. However, he may ask for further modifications and the process could go round one or more further cycles, including public consultation.

Once the Plan is found to be sound, then the landowners and developers will put in their outline and detailed planning applications, in accordance with the parameters of the Plan. But, in that process, the public will still be able to object/make constructive comments on the detailed plans as they take shape.

I have met with Gavin Collins, Archdeacon, and plan to set up a meeting, after Easter, with reps from the denominations who get involved in strategy. Hopefully we will be addressed by the Archdeacon of Oxford, who has analysed the churches' mission strategy in a number of greenfield developments – some positive stories some less so. Our aim would be to avoid reinventing the wheel and to learn from the best practice.

For information I attach an extract from the Plan as submitted with reference to places of worship. These declarations of intent are the result of several years of CTiF's association with this project, and cover not only providing space for worship, but also our role in community cohesion and "place-making".

### **Commentary** in the Plan

5.68 In addition, the need has been identified for places of worship, including at least one church, to be provided at Welborne. Such buildings are generally funded and developed by the churches (or other faith groups) and therefore will not necessarily place a burden on the development of Welborne. However, given that most churches and other places of worship play an important role in providing general community meeting space and, more widely, in contributing to community cohesion and place-making, it is right for this plan to support the delivery of such buildings.

Therefore, the comprehensive master-planning for Welborne will be expected to consider how places of worship can be incorporated into Welborne and sufficient spaces will need to be allowed for these facilities to come forward during the development of the new community. Spaces for places of worship should be incorporated into Welborne's three centres to maximise access by sustainable modes of travel. However, the Council will consider the case for one or morel**4** f these to be outside of the centres where there were good reasons for applying this. Cont. on page 15

Formal statement in the Plan

The comprehensive masterplan(s) that accompany initial planning applications shall incorporate sufficient and appropriately located space for the development of churches or other places of worship. Such reserved spaces shall be identified either within, or in close proximity to, each of Welborne's three centres. The Council will work with the site promoters and with local faith groups to support the delivery of churches and other places of worship at Welborne throughout the plan period."

Comment from the Editor: This is all very commendable and right That Christians Together in Fareham should be considering the potential requirement for new churches in a planned development as huge as this. However, this does not take away from the fact that some of our church membership are very opposed to a development as large as this on our doorsteps. We are saddened at the requirement to take away prime farming land and are concerned at the potential risk of flooding and the strain that 6000 new homes will put on the infrastructure: Roads are already overburdened and medical/hospital facilities in the area are already considerably overstretched and oversubscribed.


