

Dear friends,

One of the joys of being in full time ministry is that you get to meet a lot of lovely people - both in the church and in the wider community. I was contacted a while ago by a man called David Farndale, the Shops Manager for the Southern region of the Trussell Trust asking if we could meet up and talk about opportunities to share information and look at how churches might be able to support the Trussell Trust locally. As many of you are aware the Trussell Trust, which has a Christian foundation, works nationally and is probably most well known for its Food Bank initiative of which there are over 400 across Great Britain working to support people in our communities who are living in poverty. However, in our region, the organisation is expanding in other ways too. There are now 14 shops open in Hampshire along with a furniture 'upcycling' unit near Salisbury that looks to improve the quality of some of the donated furniture before it is passed on to be sold in their shops. Some of you will have noticed that there is now a shop next to Cafe Imbizo in West Street, Fareham, and in retail terms it is still early days for this enterprise. The shop is in need of stock to sell, mainly furniture, but other things too. They have a good band of volunteers but more are always welcome and our prayers for their work is also much appreciated.

Last month I wrote about the needs of refugees and migrants. This month, I'm writing about the needs of people in our own communities and country. Jesus said 'You will always have the poor with you....' and we are called to respond to those less fortunate than ourselves in whatever ways we can. Please see below the details of how to go about donating items to the Trussell Trust locally. Blessings

TOPICS OF INTEREST

Prayer I

This is the first of a series of articles on different ways of praying. Subjects to be covered are being and doing, meditation, Lectio Divina, imaginative contemplation of scripture, intercessory prayer, prayer and social justice. First of all, here are some introductory comments.

Rowan Williams has recently said that 'prayer is never a skill that we learn, it is much more an environment we come to live in, something we inhabit'. In other words, prayer is how we relate to God in the whole of our lives, not just when we 'turn to God in prayer.' We can be very loving when we go to church on Sunday but if we behave very differently on Monday morning, wherever we are, then we become Jekyll and Hyde Christians. Rowan Williams is reminding us that prayer is an environment we inhabit all the time.

Prayer is also not a matter of saying the right words - whatever they are. More is it a case of simply being ourselves before God. main thing in prayer is that we don't try to be what we are not. Many years ago, I heard about a school that was to be visited by the Queen. I was struck by all the preparation that went into her visit. Graffiti was scrubbed away, flowers and bushes planted, litter removed, rooms painted, and pupils and teachers were on their best behaviour. Oueen, being an official visitor, never sees things as they are. She sees things as we would like them to be. The point is that God is not an official visitor. God sees us precisely as we are so there is no point in trying to be something other than we are. Therefore we pray as we are, not as we aren't. We are ourselves, with all our failings and vulnerabilities. Prayer is letting go of our defences and letting God in. Furthermore, prayer is not an examination. You don't need a theology degree to speak to God anymore than you need a medical degree to speak to a doctor. Prayer is for amateurs and we remain amateurs all our lives. Somebody has written 'that prayer is merely the word we use to describe the practical way we allow God's love to enter into our lives.' (David Torkington, Wisdom from the Western Isles). Amateurs do things because they love doing them. Christians pray because it is a loving thing to do. In prayer we remember that God loves us just as we are and that we do our best to love God with all that we have.

POPPIES

Poppies flower in the summer, don't they? So why poppies in November? You will see them everywhere in the next week or so, and everyone from the smallest Rainbow or Beaver to the Queen will be wearing a poppy on Remembrance Sunday.

We wear poppies because, among all the mud and chaos of the battlefields of the Great War, men were amazed to see the humble field flower of home spring up where the earth was disturbed – a blood red splash of colour in a sea of khaki



When the British Legion started an appeal to help those whose bodies or minds had been


smashed by war, the poppy seemed an ideal symbol. And even now, when World War I and II seem so far away, our troops are fighting, being wounded and dying; reminding us that the poppy is also a symbol of sacrifice.

PRINT A POPPY

How? Well the answer lies in your own hands. You will need a white paper plate, red and black finger or poster paint and two margarine lids or saucers to put the paint on.

Put some newspaper on the table and start. Squeeze some red paint onto one lid or saucer and put black paint on the other one. Put your thumb into the red paint and use it to make 5 overlapping petals in a circle on the edge of your plate. Put your index finger into the black paint and use it to stamp a centre for your poppy.

Continue printing poppies all round the edge of your plate to make a wreath. Leave it to dry and then you can write 'Lest We Forget' or 'Remembrance' in the middle of the plate. You could hang the plate in your front window to share with others.
