The opening to John's gospel is one of my favourite parts of the Bible. I remember growing up in church and traditionally hearing the words at the end of the annual carol service and wondering what they were all about! Even now, their poetry contains an element of mystery that I like.

The shootings and explosions in Paris that claimed over 130 lives have just happened. Gloomy and distressing times indeed. However, the words of the opening verses of John's gospel provide comfort for us for they talk of Jesus coming into the world as 'life' and 'light'. destruction; He brings life. Amidst darkness and gloom; He brings light. Amidst intolerance and division; He brings grace. Amidst confusion and worry; He brings truth.

An Edict from Her Majesties Revenue and Customs

From the 6th April 2016, following a change in rules by HMRC, any Gift Aid Declaration Forms issued by a charity will need to include the phrase:

"I am a UK taxpayer and understand that if I pay less Income Tax and/or Capital Gains Tax than the amount of Gift Aid claimed on all my donations in that tax year it is my responsibility to pay any difference"

This affects all of our Churchgoers who make donation to our Fareham Methodist Church by Standing Order and the Gift Aid Envelope Scheme.

The Gift Aid Secretary of Fareham Methodist Church, Mr Patrick S Watson, is required to ask all of those affected to complete a new Declaration Form which includes this new phrase.

Beginning on Sunday 10th of January 2016, after the service has ended Patrick Watson & Mrs Rae Shepherd will have a table at the back of Church for you to fill in one of the New Forms. We will be setting up each Sunday if required, after that until all of our New Declarations Forms are completed.

TOPICS OF INTEREST Prayer II Being and Doing

There is great pressure in our society –and church- to do things and there is always something to do. We also get a certain satisfaction from knowing that we have done something. We can, as it were, cross it off our list of things to do. Yet, if prayer is, in any sense, a conversation then at least for some of the time we have to be still and not do anything otherwise a dialogue has not taken place. Prayer, for me, is not calling upon God to bring to God's attention a situation that he already knows about. It is opening oneself up in the presence of God to the myriad number of possibilities that could happen and the possibility of discerning one's role in a future course of action. Prayer is not talking to God *but being with him*. Prayer is an awareness of being loved. For this to happen I think that we have to be silent in the presence of God rather than present him with a tirade of words. We are therefore, not thinking about anything but concentrating on the presence of God.

In the Old Testament there is the text 'in quietness and trust shall be your strength' (Is 30:15) but there is also the well known verse in psalm 46. Amidst all the noise and tumult of war and associated calamities the psalmist closes with the verse 'be still, and know that I am God'. (Ps 46: 10) The Jerusalem bible has, 'pause a while and know that I am God'. The old Latin version has, 'empty yourself and know that I am God'. This notion of emptying ourselves is much more helpful because there is no room for God until we are empty.

Another biblical example is the story of the prophet Elijah. He feared what Queen Jezebel would do to him after her prophets had been humiliated by Elijah on Mount Carmel. He fled into the wilderness and sat down under a 'solitary broom tree' and asked that God might take away his life. (1 Kings 19: 4) He then travelled for forty days and nights until he came across a cave on Mount Sinai where he spent the night. It was here that Elijah heard the voice of God, not in a great wind, nor in an earthquake or a fire but in 'a sound of sheer silence'. (1 Kings 19: 12).

Try spending a few minutes each day just doing nothing. Allow yourself to look at God and God to look at you. Somebody once described prayer as wasting time with God. Is time spent with God ever wasted? There is no need to try very hard, no stress or strain, just be. In a very real sense, for Christians, being must always

And in the looking; And the listening; And the being; Find Me. (Ann Lewin, Watching for the Kingfisher)

Prayer III Meditation

The best time for meditation is first thing in the morning or last thing at night – perhaps for 10 minutes each time. If there are likely to be interruptions use a more convenient time. Don't attempt to overdo things at first. The important thing is to be regular and not just meditate when you feel like it. You may vary the times but try not to make up an excuse for missing a session!

It is preferable to sit alone because the presence of another person may well be distracting unless you are meditating together. There is no need to sit in a cross legged position! Sit on a chair with feet together or a few inches apart. Try to sit upright with your back straight and your hands resting on your knees, or thighs or held loosely together in your lap. Hold your head erect or slightly tilted and close your eyes.

It is important to be comfortable because if you aren't your mind will find your discomfort a source of irritation and keep telling you! The reason for keeping upright is that if you don't there is a tendency to slouch and you may find yourself going to sleep! This can happen anyway so try not to meditate after a heavy meal.

The hardest thing to combat in meditation is the racing mind. Our thoughts are always on hand to distract us. We are all familiar with this so there is no need for me to elaborate. One way of controlling your thoughts is to simply concentrate on your breathing. Breathe normally but be aware of inhaling and exhaling. When you find your thoughts wandering, focus again on your breathing. Another suggestion would be to spend time focusing on your body – Where are the pressure points? Feel your feet on the ground and your back against the chair etc. Have you any aches and pains? These are both ways of bringing us into the present moment, which is where God is. The only reality is now.

Finally, some people find it helpful to focus on an object – a candle, a picture, an icon etc. These are aids to concentration. As always, you meditate in ways that are helpful to you. The aim of Christian meditation is to make ourselves accessible and open to God. Of course, we cannot control God but, at least, we are giving him the opportunity to speak in the depths of our being. As the hymn writer says:-

Breathe through the heats of our desire thy coolness and thy balm; let sense be dumb, let flesh retire; speak through the earthquake, wind, and fire, O still small voice of calm! (Hymns and Psalms 495)

Enough is enough

Major UK Churches (including the Methodist Church) are warning that the government's Welfare Reform and Work Bill marks a dangerous shift away from a core principle of the Welfare State and will make poor people even poorer.

A YouGov survey commissioned by the Churches has also revealed that 61% of UK adults believe that welfare benefits should be set at a level that allows families with children to cover their basic costs. In contrast, only 25% of those polled said they thought that benefits should be set deliberately low to encourage families to find work or get more work.

"No child should be left without enough in order to motivate their parents," said Paul Morrison, Public Issues Policy Adviser for the Methodist Church and author of the report. "If children live in a family which doesn't have enough money, they are more likely to die young, do worse at school, and experience worse health. Many of these families are already in work and working very hard. Any policy that claims that taking £1,000 from a family will enhance the life-chances of its children, as the Bill does, is not only supremely questionable but morally flawed."

The report, *Enough: Our responsibility to meet families' needs*, highlights how the Bill threatens to undermine a founding principle of the Welfare State: namely, that the amount families receive in benefits should be sufficient to meet their basic needs. The Churches say the Bill will break the link be-

"As Christians we believe all people are made in God's image," continued Paul. "We do not believe that we should ever deliberately deprive a person, a family, a child of enough to thrive or to fulfil their God-given potential. We are asking that the Welfare State holds to its founding principles, and seeks to provide enough so that every child can have the best chance in life."

The Churches are asking people to pray, to read the report (along with a short video explaining why *Enough* matters) and <u>write to</u> their MPs.

Statement on the Paris attacks

The Revd Steven Wild, President of the Conference, and Dr Jill Barber, Vice-President of the Conference have issued the following statement about the attacks in Paris:

"We, and all the Methodist people, pray for all the victims of the attacks in Paris on Friday night. We hold in our prayers all those who seek to offer comfort and support in the days and weeks ahead."




HOLLY


Holly is an evergreen, which means that it does not lose its leaves in the autumn, but keeps them all year round. And because its leaves are always green it is a symbol of eternal
