

Dear friends, The Psalmist says in Psalm 46 ‘Be still and know that I am God’ and this is no easy plea. The Psalm’s context is that the nations are in uproar, mountains are shaking and trembling and waters are roaring. There is a storm going on, physical and metaphorical. And in the midst of this the Psalmist gives voice to God’s plea.

It can be hard to ‘be still’ in a world that demands we are to be busy on the 24/7 merry-go-round of life. Sometimes the church feeds in to this busyness too. There is always a job to be done, a meeting to go to and a decision to make and sometimes these things can become our main focus and we forget that call to ‘be still’; to break; to pause and be quiet in ourselves and before God. In the coming weeks we have opportunities to ‘be still’ if we allow ourselves to hear that plea. The beginning of November is traditionally a time of remembrance culminating in Remembrance Day services and commemorations on the 13th. On Sunday 6th November at 3pm at Portchester Methodist Church there is a Service to Remember Loved Ones. This is for anyone who wishes to set time aside to remember family and friends who have died and everyone is very welcome to come along and share in that time with others. Times of remembrance are pause moments – times to reflect, give thanks and then move on again with gratitude for those who have gone before us and for the freedom that we have and share. There is something intensely moving about the silence and the stillness that we hold together on such occasions.

The end of this month sees the beginning of Advent. Strangely enough, Advent can also be a time to ‘be still’ and pause from the rush of life. Advent has been more or less lost in the celebrations of Christmas. Christmas begins around mid-November for many (more and more people have trees and lights on show before December even begins) and finishes on Boxing Day! The traditional sales in shops and retail outlets now begin before we even get into Christmas week. Christmas merchandise has been on the shelves in my local supermarket since the end of August! Advent though, is different, and offers an alternative to us. Advent is a time of pausing and waiting, a time to ‘be still’ and prepare our hearts and lives for the coming of the One who changes everything - Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us.

My prayer is that each one of us finds a regular time to ‘be still’ in the coming weeks so that we are ready for all that the end of the year holds and we can truly celebrate Christmas, with hearts open and ready to welcome Jesus Christ again into our hearts, our lives and the community of which we are a part.

A few of us met with Deacon Brian Purchase from St James Road (SJR) Methodist Church, Southampton last month for an informal chat about WLTD0. Brian is one of the regional co-ordinators and also has the experience of starting the scheme at his church. We soon identified a number of groups within the church or using the premises that we could approach to see if this is a scheme that would interest them. It gives the Dads quality time with their children in a safe environment and provides the Mums with space to do their own thing! Brian's WLTD0 caters mainly for pre-school children as they found the older children could be quite boisterous. However, we felt this could be managed by using the large hall as well as the church hall. The sessions are held once a month on a Saturday morning. Hot and cold drinks, bacon butties etc and newspapers are available. SJR ask for a £2 donation towards the cost. Their numbers continue to increase as the word is spread by mouth amongst the young families.

It would be great if we had a few men who would like to try this out. Visits to SJR can be arranged and the ladies are prepared to help you but it needs to be run by the men.



Hurricane Matthew hits Haiti

Hurricane Matthew hit the West Coast of Haiti on Tuesday 5 October with devastating effect, leaving hundreds dead and thousands displaced.

The BBC reported that at least 10,000 people were in shelters along with reports of overcrowded hospitals and shortages of fresh water. The storm knocked down communications and blocked roads, hampering emergency efforts.

British Methodist Mission Partners in Haiti, John and Sharon Harbottle have managed to get a couple of emails through to us. They say: "Many areas of Port-au-Prince have suffered from extensive flooding, and the water pouring out of the mountains is likely to continue to increase for a day or two yet as it is still raining.

"Roofs have been blown off many homes and many people are in refuge centres. We understand that the authorities tried to clear people from the areas most at risk before the hurricane arrived, and everyone received text messages on their mobile phones giving guidance.

"The situation further to the west, where the centre of the hurricane made landfall, a little to the west of Les Cayes, is much worse. A few reports have been received from there indicating the town has had significant flooding, damage to buildings and trees are down.

"We have not been able to make contact with folk in that area nor in the Jeremie area, and we have now heard that one of the bridges on the main road from Port au Prince to the west has been washed away so there is no road access to the worst hit parts of the southern peninsula.

"Please continue to pray for the country and especially those in the areas closer to the central track of the hurricane."

An emergency fund is now open to support the Methodist Church in Haiti as it helps in rebuilding communities in the hurricane-affected areas. Donations can be made [online](#), or by cheque or bank transfer.

Christian Aid Week donation of £6,524.85 from the Fareham and Portchester Christian Aid Group : Thank you very much for all your hard work during Christian Aid Week this year. Please do pass on our thanks to all those who volunteered their time in support of our work, especially the 22 house-to-house collectors. We are truly grateful for all you do.

The focus of Christian Aid Week 2016 was on our work in Bangladesh, one of the poorest countries in the world, and on the people living on the chars or low-lying islands in the Brahmaputra river, for whom devastating floods are a terrifying part of everyday life. Living on a char in the river means living in fear. It means never truly feeling safe, or having a place to call home. But with nowhere else to go, and no defences against the flood, all they can do is hope.

Morsheda, a young mother of four, lives in a corrugated shack. She has no land, no assets, no savings, and the only work she can get is doing backbreaking manual labour for as little as 74p a day. Bangladesh's annual floods have trapped Morsheda in an inescapable cycle of suffering. No matter how hard she works, every year the floods threaten to destroy her modest resources and leave her with nothing.

Creating an earth plinth 6-8ft above water level could give Morsheda a safe place to rebuild her house, keep livestock and grow essential crops without worrying they'll be washed away. As an example of what the money raised in Christian Aid Week might buy, £250 is enough to provide Morsheda or another family like hers, a flood-proof home, and the chance of creating a safer, more secure future. In emergency situations and in our long-term development work, Christian Aid tackles the causes and the symptoms of poverty.

Thanks again to you and all those who have taken part in the fundraising efforts for Christian Aid Week 2016.
