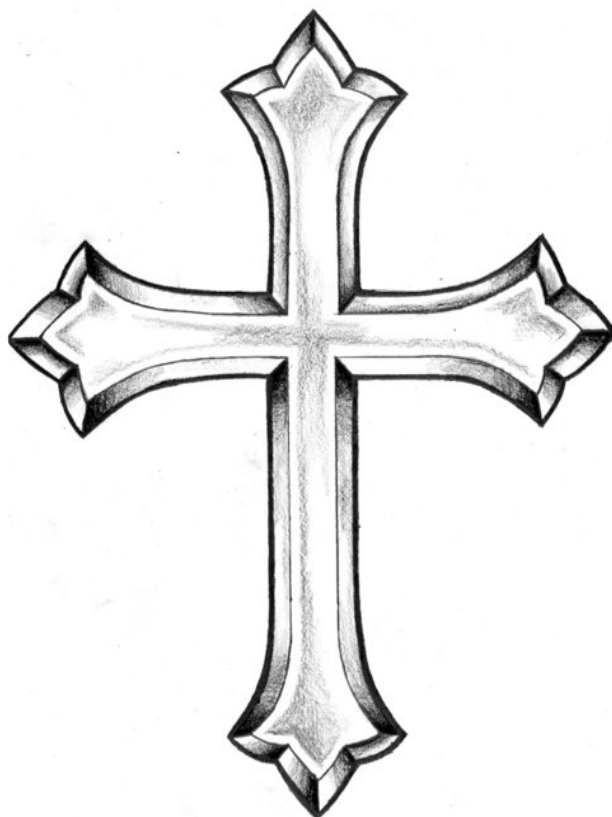

## Grave Talk

The truth is that we are all going to die. We don't like to talk about this and leave important questions unanswered until it is, literally, too late. But the practicalities and the emotions around death do need to be dealt with and GraveTalk provides a safe, relaxed and friendly setting where that can happen.

People can drink coffee, eat biscuits and talk about death. They can ask questions, share worries or just air their thoughts and break down the taboos surrounding death. Caring and compassionate conversations can happen no matter where we are on life's journey. This is not only for the old.

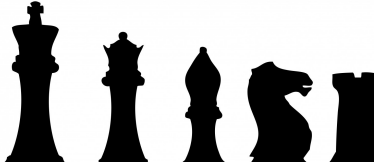
A successful GraveTalk pilot has recently been held in Fareham. Three café style meetings, featuring coffee, biscuits and conversation took place in three different venues. Members of the public came to share their thoughts, ideas and experiences in small groups supported by a facilitator and prompted by questions on a set of conversation cards. These helped start conversations that became wide-ranging. Sometimes it is easier to have 'deep' conversations with strangers whom one might never see again, than with friends or family.

Feedback from the participants said that they found it enjoyable, an interesting experience and valuable because it was not, in general, an easy subject to discuss. Humour and laughter were part of the atmosphere. The simple ground rules ensure that everyone's opinions are respected and valued and a facilitator on each table ensures that no one person can dominate. This is a really 'safe place'.

The GraveTalk format was developed by the Anglican church and officially launched at Portsmouth Cathedral in May 2015. It is for people of all faiths and none. It is not a bereavement counselling or grief group. The organisers do not claim to be experts.

The impetus for the Fareham project came from members of the Fareham Quaker Worship Group, supported by the Reverend Carol Gully, Spiritual Care Chaplain for the Rowans Hospice, and Rachel Hicks, chairperson of Christians Together in Fareham.

Three further sessions of GraveTalk are now planned at Westbury Manor Museum Fareham on the second Monday of the month. The dates are 14 May, 11 June and 9 July between 2 and 4p.m.. 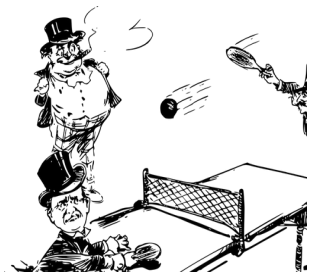

Why are you going there?

This is the question Ian and I asked one rainy morning in Stratford-upon-Avon as we waited for the bus to Coventry. The lady addressed couldn't understand why we wanted to visit such a place when there were far more attractive places to visit – and that's the polite terminology! I had first visited Coventry Cathedral as a teenager for a youth service shortly after it had been consecrated. I remembered the huge tapestry and the vastness of the place. It took a while to find our way around the city but we eventually stumbled across a visitors' centre where we told all about Coventry's three cathedrals, namely the 12<sup>th</sup> century Priory Church of St Mary, which was destroyed by Henry VIII, the medieval Parish Church Cathedral of St Michael, which was bombed in 1940, and the modern Coventry Cathedral also named for St Michael. We could have spent a lot longer in the centre but our 'mission' was to spend time in the new cathedral. We achieved this with the help of a guide and learnt much about the building and the people involved in the construction. Inspired by the message of Christ for reconciliation, the then leaders of the Cathedral Community decided to build a new Cathedral and preserve the old one to remind

everyone of the folly and horrors of war. Two hundred designs were submitted and judged by their number, without the names of the architects. The decision was unanimous and Sir Basil Spence started to build the new Cathedral. He certainly was a man of great faith and vision and commissioned work from various other artists such as Graham Sutherland, John Piper, Jacob Epstein and Elizabeth Frink. We spent nearly two hours with our guide hearing about the reason why saints and angels were engraved on the south window through which the ruined cathedral can be seen, the significance of the curved wall of coloured glass around the font, which is a boulder from Bethlehem, the 'thorns' decorating the choir stalls and other parts of the Cathedral together with the huge tapestry behind the high altar. This is only a fraction of what we learnt that day. All I can say is that if you have a chance to go to Coventry to visit these places and learn something of this fascinating city as well as its Cathedrals and if you get a guide, called Michael, I hope you will be as inspired as we were by the work of these men and women of faith. Yes, I will go again to Coventry.
