We also remember at this time of year all those who have lost their lives in war and turmoil: those who have made the ultimate sacrifice for the greater good and freedom of others.

Our remembering this year has a particular weight to it and we seek to offer comfort and support wherever possible to those who we know who are remembering loved ones at this time. One of the readings that we usually have at the annual Service to Remember Loved Ones is the traditional Jewish Prayer of Remembrance. As we take a moment to pause and remember in our own way the words of this prayer may be helpful:

In the rising of the sun and in its going down, we remember them.

In the blowing of the wind and in the chill of winter, we remember them.

In the opening of buds and in the rebirth of spring, we remember them.

In the blueness of the sky and in the warmth of summer, we remember them.

In the rustling of leaves and in the beauty of autumn, we remember them.

In the beginning of the year and when it ends, we remember them.

When we are weary and in need of strength, we remember them.

When we are lost and sick at heart, we remember them.

When we have joys we yearn to share, we remember them.

So long as we live, they too shall live, for they are now a part of us, as we remember them.
